COMMODITY PRICES STILL ADVANCE IN U. S

Generally quiet conditions ruled in the principal wholesale markets in the United States last week, but prices continued to show an upward tendency, with forty-three gains appearing in the comprehensive list of quotations compiled by Dun's Review, as against thirty-three recessions. In a similar comparison for the previous week fifty-nine advances compared with thirty-one declines; while for the corresponding week a year ago, sixty-

two out of eighty-nine changes were in a downward direction. Prices of iron and steel disclose further slight concessions, but the market seems close to a stable basis.
