the first ringier in the large hall used
by the city on Sundays as a dance
hall. He was the first promoter to give
the ringier an opportunity to fight.

CRICKET IN NOVA SCOTIA

Rev. R. P. Dixon, president of the
Windsor Cricket Club writes to the
Amherst News:—
"I am writing to try and arouse the
interest of your readers in the move-
ment started last year in the Annapolis
Valley, the city of Halifax, the
county of Pictou and in Cape Breton
Island for the revival of the
grand old game of cricket. Speaking
for ourselves, I may say that starting
in this town in the month of June, 1926
with a hastily formed club we closed
the season last October with five
victories in six matches. The merit on
which all the recent correspondence
itself quite rightly insisted is that a
floating ball will not allow itself to be
driven, even by a Mr. Tolley, to the
hugh lengths that those balls will go
which recent legislation permits. There
are others—as that the lighter ball can be
stopped more readily; the "pouched-leg"
shot may be restored to the game. Also
it needs more skill for holding up into
a side wind and for low driving into
a head wind. But above all it does not
so effectively make fools of courses
originally laid out for gutta-percha balls,
and the fun of the game lies in hitting
the ball, not in walking a quarter of a
mile in order to hit it again.
