**HEALTH BILL AND
VOCATIONAL EDUCATION
ACT PASS IN HOUSE**

Fredricton, April 25.—Three important sessions of the legislature were held today. Among the bills dealt with were the health bill, the St. John assessment act and one on vocational training. There is a possibility that the house will prorogue this evening.

"If it is found that the constitution requires that I should stand for re-election, if I am selected to head this department, the house may depend upon it that I will not accept the office without standing for re-election as I had expected to do," said Hon. Dr. Roberts. "I would have no fear in placing this issue before the electors of St. John and I would welcome the opportunity to do so," he said.

Consideration of the health bill occupied the attention of the house in committee, all morning, all afternoon and until 10.30 o'clock in the evening. After Dr. Roberts' concession had been accepted there was little further effort on the part of the opposition to oppose the bill and the members on both sides devoted themselves to serious consideration of the bill and to the preparation of such amendments as were found desirable.

When the committee's work was completed and the bill reported, Hon. Dr. Roberts received hearty congratulations from all sides on his success in putting the measure through. To prepare, introduce and pilot through the house such an important measure of so revolutionary a character scarcely a year after having been elected to the legislature for the first time is regarded as an unusual achievement.

**THE WAR NEWS IN
LAST NIGHT'S CABLES**

The great double German drive, in the Somme and Arras sectors, which began on Wednesday morning, has developed into a terrific struggle. The British, having been forced back out of Villers-Bretonneux, launched a counter attack and swept the Germans back almost to the lines which were held before the present fighting began. The French have been driven back out of Hangard-en-Santerre, but are holding their positions close by, while to the north again, on the line southwest of Ypres, the British have been compelled to withdraw slightly before furious attacks along the Meteren-Bailliet-Wytsate line.

Notwithstanding the frantic preparations made by the Germans for a continuance of their drive toward Amiens and the extreme violence of the fighting the gains thus far in that region have been very small.

It is unofficially reported that from four to six German divisions, or from 40,000 to 72,000 men, have been hurled at the British and French lines near Ypres. The retirement of the British in this sector must have been small, for there are no great gains reported by Berlin so far. It was rumored on Thursday that Mount Kemmel, a dominating height north of Wulverghem, had been taken by the enemy, but this has not been confirmed.

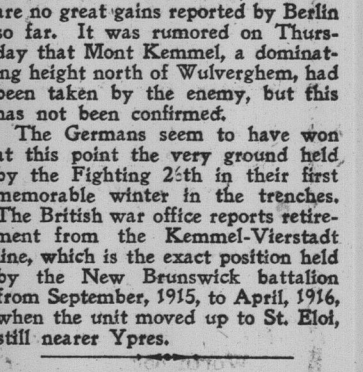
The Germans seem to have won at this point the very ground held by the Fighting 24th in their first memorable winter in the trenches. The British war office reports retirement from the Kemmel-Viersteld line, which is the exact position held by the New Brunswick battalions from September, 1915, to April, 1916, when the unit moved up to St. Eloi, still nearer Ypres.

CONFIDENCE IN HON. F. B. CARVELL

Ottawa, April 25.—A discussion on public works estimates in the house today brought to the first generous note of approval for union government methods from the opposition side of the house. Hon. Rudolph Buxton, in discussing some Quebec appropriations, remarked that the opposition was confident there would be no waste of money under Hon. Mr. Carvell's regime.

Answering complaints the New Brunswick minister declared with emphasis that officials who still persisted in following the "patronage god" would be removed where they would be no longer needed. He also announced there would be a shakeup of the engineering staff of the department in Nova Scotia.

Mr. Carvell admitted he was having more trouble with the over-manning problem in connection with cutting down expenses than with any other. It was a hard thing to tell a man who, perhaps, had been in the government employ for a long time, but whose services were really unnecessary that he was no longer needed. He had been engaged in getting reliable reports on every office of the department. These reports showed that a large number of men were not earning their salaries. The public works department had recently taken over all the work in connection with the buildings for the military hospitals, commission, and it was hoped that some of the employees of the department, who were not

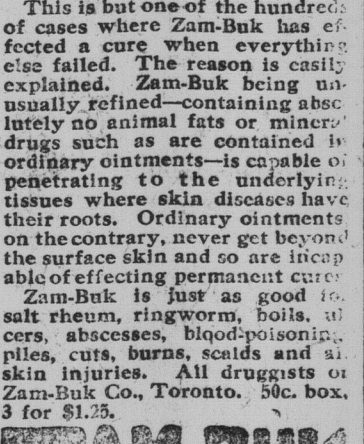

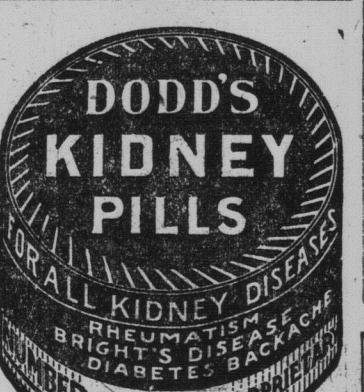
