

Aggregate For Year Shows a Considerable Increase.

(Montreal Journal of Commerce.) Fredericton, N. B., June 10—Automo (Montreal Journal of Commerce.)

Fredericton, N. B., June 10—Automobile licenses fees in New Brunswick average \$300 a day, according to figures furnished by the office of the public works department. During the present year it is estimated that 1,400 automobiles will be in operation in New Brunswick when the season is well underway. So far 638 cars have been furnished 1914 licenses. There were 824 cars registered in the province during the entire season of 1913, but from the increase it is expected the present year will be a record-breaker. The department has up to date colected \$6,000 in license fees, which is \$1,000 ahead of the collections for the same time last year, notwithstanding the lateness of the spring and its effect on the automobile business. Registration fees and taxes are coming into the department at a rate of \$300 daily, while 200 of the registered 309 chauffeurs in the province are still to be heard from.

Secretary Blair has requested the chief of police of each city and town in the province to send the names of the auto owners who are hunning cars without 1914 licenses, and a large list of owners and chauffeurs have been reported who have failed to comply with the law.
