CARMARTHEN STREET CHURCH ANNIVERSARY The forty-second anniversary of the congregation of the Carmarthen street Methodist church was celebrated yesterday with appropriate services. The congregations were large both morning and evening, when Rev. Hamilton Wigle, B. A., of Amherst (N. S.), was the preacher, and delivered impressive and eloquent sermons. There was a fine turn out of the Sunday school in the afternoon also, which was addressed by Rev. Dr. George M. Campbell and Rev. Mr. Wigle. The choir of the church sang special music at all the services. Rev. Mr. Wigle is a preacher of great earnestness and power. His sermons were marked by deep independent thought and a deep impression was made on his hearers. His subject in the morning was the Epistle of the Soul. In the evening he answered the old question, "What is Sin?" in a sermon remarkable for a fearless handling of the subject. The open meeting of the Sunday school, at which Rev. Dr. Campbell and Rev. Mr. Wigle delivered addresses, was held at 230. The offerings at all the services were in aid of the trust fund of the church. This evening at 8 o'clock Rev. Mr. Wigle will deliver his famous lecture on a Modern Crusade. This lecture was prepared at Winnipeg, during the course of Mr. Wigle's pastorate in that city, and by request was repeated several times. The reports of this lecture which have appeared in the press are all of a flattering nature. There will be a meeting of the Epworth League of the church tomorrow evening, and on Wednesday night the celebration will be concluded with a congregational social. TWO KILLED IN C.P.R. WRECK Moosejaw, Sask., Jan. 21.—News was received here today of a bad wreck at Moosejaw, on the Port of the C. P. R. The passenger extra, No. 205, running into Moosejaw from the south, was run into by a snowplow shortly after midnight. Two passengers in the sleeping car were killed and three mail clerks and a porter injured. The dead are: F. J. Hunt, commercial traveler, ticketed from Toronto to Seattle. R. Chapman, traveler, Toronto to Malabar. The injured mail clerks are Lewis, Manly and Greenough. The porter's name is Coble. The injured are expected to recover. CHARLOTTE COUNTY FISHERMEN TO ASK FOR A REDUCTION PLAN J. A. Belyea returned home Saturday evening from St. George where he had been attending the annual meeting of the Charlotte County Fish and Game Association. The meeting was held at St. George in the Foresters' hall on Saturday at noon. The meeting, he said, was largely attended and in addition to the election of officers some very important business was transacted. Last season's poor catch of sardine herring was the principal matter discussed and the enquiring into the reason of it brought out some spirited discussions, which resulted in several resolutions being passed. The supposed motor boat epidemic was debated at length and the general consensus of opinion was that the use of the motor boat was injurious. A resolution was passed to be forwarded to the department of marine and fisheries asking for an investigation and also the passing of legislation making compulsory the use of man-powered boats. In discussing this question, opinion was also expressed at the meeting that the introduction of dog fish, silver hake, and squid were greatly responsible for the unprecedented scarcity. In order to offset this it was felt that there should be established in Charlotte county or vicinity a reduction plant similar to those established in Nova Scotia. The establishment of the reduction plant, it was thought, would encourage the fishermen to catch the destructive fish. A resolution to this effect was ordered to be sent to the department of marine and fisheries. The election of officers resulted in Mr. Belyea being chosen president. He has held this office since the previous year. The members of the executive committee were as follows: Captain J. Estabrook, President; A. O'Neill, St. Andrews; W. Holt, Bokabee. In their annual reports this year the executive committee set no price for sardine herring, as has always been the custom. It was decided to leave this to be worked out by the members themselves. BELIEVES PROVINCE IS READY FOR PROHIBITION Rev. Dr. Hutchinson Gives Strong Address Before Every Day Club—Other Temperance Talks "I believe this province is ripe for prohibition, and that if Premier Haas would give the people an opportunity to vote on it the result would open his eyes so wide that he would never get them closed again on that point." This statement, made by Rev. Dr. Hutchinson at the Every Day Club last evening, was applauded by the audience that filled the hall. The speaker discussed the origin, progress and ultimate victory of the temperance cause. He told of the first temperance societies formed in Belfast, Glasgow and Preston (Eng.), in 1829, and quoted the remarkably moderate pledges taken in those early days. Reference was also made to the early days in New England, when liquors were freely drunk at the ordination of ministers. Contrasting that of today, he declared that the progress would continue until the liquor traffic was destroyed. Dr. Hutchinson asserted that no man could give a moral reason for the continued existence of the saloon, and that it debased the men who were in the business. He made pointed reference to some of his own ministerial experiences with victims of drink in this city, and declared that liquor drinking was chiefly responsible for the poverty that exists, because families suffer for necessities that should be purchased with money spent for liquor. He appealed to his hearers to exert the power they possessed to bring about prohibition. The orchestra, under the direction of Prof. W. C. Bowden, played among other fine numbers Gomon's Marche Pontificale. Evangelist John Leod was the speaker at the Thorne Lodge gospel temperance meeting yesterday afternoon, in the Haymarket square hall. The meeting was largely attended. J. Tiller presided and James A. Belyea conducted the devotional service. The gospel temperance meeting last night under the auspices of Granite Rock division S. of T., in their hall, Market place, Carleton, was very largely attended. R. Bruce Addison delivered an inspiring address and Rev. W. R. Robinson acted as chairman. You may drive some men away from drink but they will track back of their own accord.
