

ONTARIO AND THE DOMINION HONOR LT. GOV. CLARKE

State Funeral at St. Paul's
Anglican Church, Toronto,
Conducted by Bishop
Sweeney and Other Clergy
—Imposing Procession.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Toronto, Aug. 31.—With all the reverential honors of church, military and state, the funeral of His Honor Lionel H. Clarke, lieutenant-governor of Ontario, took place this afternoon.
At 11 o'clock the body lay in state at Government House and many hundreds of people, who were unable to pay their last respects yesterday, had an opportunity to do so today.
After a short private service at Government House, the body was removed to St. Paul's Anglican church, where the public service was conducted before a congregation which crowded the big edifice. Rt. Rev. Dr. Sweeney, lord bishop of Toronto, assisted by Rev. Archdeacon Cody, Rev. Canon Broughall and other clergymen, officiated. All the addresses were impressively eulogistic of the character and work of the governor.
His Excellency the Governor-General and Lady Byng, Sir Edward Kemp and Hon. J. D. Reid, representing the Dominion government; Hon. E. C. Drury, premier of Ontario, and many of the Ontario cabinet ministers and members of the legislature were present.
Following the funeral service the cor-

lege, fully military and state, was formed and proceeded to Mount Pleasant cemetery, where interment was made.
Two troops of the Royal Canadian Dragoons and the military band were at the head of the funeral procession, which included nearly a mile of carriages and automobiles bearing the federal, provincial and civic representatives.

SEES "MOST IMMORAL" AGE
Evangelist Urges Less Attention to Campaign for Money.

Winona Lake, Ind., Sept. —O. E. Hamilton of Mount Pleasant, Mo., President of the National Evangelistic Association of Disciples of Christ, in an address before the association's convention here, urged that less attention be paid by church organizations to monetary campaigns and that more thought be given to evangelization.
"The church that loses the evangelistic spirit loses the life of Christ," he said. "When money is made the basis of orthodoxy, the church will grow formal, mechanical. The demise of the Inter-Church Movement came because the public was impressed with the money appeal first, rather than the life appeal."
Mr. Hamilton said that the present period is the most immoral in the history of this country, and called upon ministers to study the complexities of the age closely.
"Many a preacher understands the time of Christ better than the age of Woodrow Wilson and Theodore Roosevelt," he asserted.
Voicing an appeal for a greater observance of the Sabbath, the speaker declared himself in favor of an organized, nation-wide propaganda for the five and one-half day week for all classes of labor. A half holiday each week, he argued, would give people an opportunity for more recreation and would thereby bring many to church who now spend the Sabbath in recreations that the present system does not permit on week days.

SEIZE DRUGS WORTH
\$35,000 IN TRUNK

Detroit, Sept. —One of the chief supply stations for drugs, especially morphine, in Detroit, according to the police, was raided and a quantity of the latter drug valued at \$35,000 confiscated. Members of the drug squad said the amount confiscated was larger than has ever before been taken from one person. The entire case will be turned over to Federal authorities for investigation.
The police believe the arrest of Pauline Kelly, 37 years old, 160 High street, in whose trunk they say they found the drug, was the turning up of one of the largest drug rings in the city. In the woman's trunk, officials say, they found several hundred cubes of morphine, six syringes for injecting the drug, 20 needles and a spoon which had been used for cooking. The police say they have evidence indicating that the woman and several others have been supplying addicts of this district for some time.

CLASS AS IMBECILE
BRIGHT BOY SCHOLAR

United States May Deport Russian Lad
With Fine School Record.

New York, Sept. 1.—Owing to a technicality in the law whereby an appeal can not be taken from an Immigration Board of Inquiry, a 10-year-old lad, who in the last six months passed through two regular school grades, receiving a grading of 100 in his last month of study, faces deportation next month as an imbecile.
Federal Judge Manton, sitting in the Brooklyn District Federal Court, declined to interfere in the case when the lad's father applied for a writ of certiorari for a review of the decision of the Immigration Board, and the boy's only hope lies now in an appeal to the president.

Melchior Shulman, the youngest son of Nathan Shulman, a musician of Brooklyn, arrived in this country from Russia with his mother, September 21, 1920, after undergoing great hardships during the three years that they had been trying to leave Russia. Shulman had been in the United States eight years, and had become a citizen and the possessor of a comfortable home and income. A board of inquiry at Ellis Island classified Melchior as an imbecile, and admitted him only on \$1,000 bail for one year.

F. W. Wallace, Sussex, editor of the Canadian Funeral Director, was in the city yesterday conferring with P. J. Fitzpatrick, president, regarding the annual convention of the N. B.
