AIRSHIP DAMAGED

McCurdy Has Unfortunate Accident With Silver Dart.

MAKES SUCCESSFUL FLIGHT

Young Canadian Aviator In Trial at Petawawa Travels Up and Down Field Carrying Passenger, But Finds a Knoll While Landing—Will Rush New Machine at Once—Principles a Success.

Petawawa Camp, Aug. 3.—From the aviators' standpoint, the future of the preliminary trials of the "Silver Dart" over Petawawa common early yesterday was the successful working of the new motor.

The aerodrome attained the highest speed yet made in Canada—forty miles an hour or more—carried for the first time an additional passenger. Four flights, or hops, were made, the first three being about half-mile each, and the fourth about three-quarters of a mile.

Unfortunately, when making the fourth landing, the sun dazzled the aviator and the forward wheel of the aerodrome struck a knoll at an angle and the machine ricocheted and fell on its side, wrecking the wings and framework. The motor remained uninjured. The aviator received only a few scratches.

The trials were held before sunrise. No wind was blowing and weather conditions were perfect. J. D. McCurdy, with whom the "Silver Dart" has always been associated, was in the front position, in charge of the controlling apparatus, and Casey Baldwin went along as a passenger. The propeller was started and, under heavy pressure, the aerodrome moved swiftly forward. After traveling a short distance along the ground until proper speed had been acquired, a slight turn in the bow control was

WANTS FULL CHARGE.

Australia Must Control Own Forces, Declares Argus.

Melbourne, Australia, Aug. 3.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—The Argus says that the Imperial Defence Conference deliberations cannot lead to a successful conclusion unless Britain makes a full, intelligent provision for the diversified interests and local aspirations of the colonies. Australia is unalterably determined to build her own navy and train citizens by a system of compulsory cadet service.

"But," the Argus continues, "Australia, first and foremost, demands the service both of our soldiers and of our ships, and cannot permit another voice in their control. In an imperial crisis, Australia would gladly place the whole armament at Britain's disposal, but by consent not by compulsion."

The Argus remarks that the Little Englander now seems as rare as the Canadian or the Australian who would wish to cut loose from the Empire.

Trade Expert From Germany.

London, Aug. 3.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—The German Commercial Treaties Association has memorialized the German Chancellor for the appointment of a trade expert in Canada. The request is based upon replies received to a circular addressed by the association to a large number of firms trading with Canada, by whom such an appointment is considered highly desirable. At the same time many firms remark that the end of the tariff war is of far greater importance, as before normal trade relations have been restored between Germany and Canada, no very great results are to be expected from the appointment of a trade expert.

Glennah Hits Breakwater.

Port Colborne, Aug. 3.—The steamer Glennah, owned by the Inland Navigation Co. of Hamilton, struck the breakwater here early yesterday morning, doing twenty to thirty thousand dollars' damage.

The steamer had passed through the canal and was on her way out. When nearing the breakwater, her wheel chain became clogged. She struck the breakwater head on. Her forward compartments are full of water. She was loaded with a general cargo, Montreal to Port William.

Fatal Exhibition.

Providence, Mass., Aug. 3.—"I was not a prize fight nor a boxing bout, but an exhibition for a moving picture machine," said Admiral Seaton Scherzer yesterday, in reference to the death of Hiram H. Foster, a colored messmate on board the battleship Vermont Sunday night, after going six rounds with a messmate on Friday evening. Foster died of cerebral hemorrhages, caused by a blow or fall.

Scarcity of Labor.

Port Arthur, Aug. 3.—I. Dix Fraser, manager of Atkinson Iron Co.'s blast furnaces, states that the blow in will take place early this week. Everything is practically ready to recommence the manufacture of pig iron.

Contractors who are endeavoring to hire men for railroad work on the N.Y.R.R. north of Niagara are finding it very difficult to procure labor.

11,300 Buildings Burned.

Tokio, Aug. 3.—An official report on the damage by the great fire at Osaka places the number of dwellings destroyed at 11,368, including eleven office buildings, eight schools, four banks, ten business blocks and twenty temples. There was but one death, due to illness, caused by the fire.

An investigation of the disaster has been begun. About 500 are receiving public assistance.

British Control of Railroads.

Paris, Aug. 3.—Franklin K. Lane, a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission, is at present in France studying the regulations applied to French railroads.

He has just come from England, where he has been the counsel both in the matter of rates and the issue of capital, to be most effective.

EMPEROR AT COWES

Czar Nicholas Is Given a Splendid Welcome by King.

DIPLOMATISTS TAKE PART

Sir Edward Grey, M. Iswolsky and Count Von Benckendorff Engage In Conference—King and Several Members of Family Are Assisted In Welcome by 150 Warships—Czar May Go to Turkey.

Cowes, Aug. 3.—The Russian imperial yacht Standart, bringing the Emperor and the Empress from Cherbourg to Cowes, on a visit to King Edward, anchored in the Cowes roadstead shortly before 1 o'clock yesterday.

Their Majesties were given an official welcome even more imposing than usually attends such occasions. Not only were King Edward and Queen Alexandra, the Prince and Princess of Wales and a large gathering of other members of the royal family present to greet their guests, but 150 of the pick of the British war fleet, dressed in flags from stem to stern and flying the Russian ensign, encircled the anchorage allotted to the Standart.

The presence of the English Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, M. Iswolsky, the Russian Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Count Von Benckendorff, the Russian ambassador to Great Britain, further emphasized the significance attached in the diplomatic world to this visit of the Russian Emperor to England.

The unusual welcome of yesterday morning was arranged designedly for the double purpose of helping to strengthen the links in the chain binding Great Britain, France and Russia in a triple entente, and to dissipate any ill-feelings engendered by the harsh denunciation of Emperor Nicholas and his methods, so frequently vented by the members of the Labor party both in and out of Parliament since the coming of the Emperor was first announced.

The function, however, was distinctly official in character and so strongly the cordons of steel walls that there was no chance for a popular demonstration either for or against Emperor Nicholas.

King Edward and Queen Alexandra went out on board the royal yacht Victoria and Albert and met the Standart outside of Spithead. King Edward went over to the Standart and welcomed his guests, and then escorted them to the Victoria and Albert, where luncheon was served. After this the two sovereigns reviewed the assembled fleets from the Victoria and Albert.

King Edward, Emperor Nicholas and the Prince and Princess of Wales, Sir John Fisher, chief naval aide to King Edward, and Reginald McKenna, First Lord of the Admiralty, and a number of British royal householders, were on the bridge of the Standart.

At night the Russian Emperor and Empress dined with King Edward and Queen Alexandra and the members of the British royal household on board the Victoria and Albert. All the ships in the harbor were illuminated last night.

The dinner was a brilliant function. The dining-room was beautifully decorated with red roses, and on the table was a magnificent display of gold plates.

Besides the King and Queen and the Emperor and Empress, the guests were the Crown Prince and Crown Princess of Sweden, the Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, Premier Asquith, Sir Edward Grey, Reginald McKenna and M. Iswolsky.

The King then proposed a toast to the Russian monarch, declaring that the navy was only in the interests of peace. His Majesty also referred to the pleasure at recently meeting a number of members of the Russian Donma, and made allusion to Emperor Nicholas' former visit to England.

In responding, Emperor Nicholas said that the magnificent naval review he had witnessed bore full testimony to England's greatness. His Majesty said he always would remember the days he had spent with the beloved and venerated Queen Victoria.

Czar Will Visit Turkey.

Cherbourg, Aug. 3.—Foreign Minister Iswolsky yesterday confirmed the reported intention of Emperor Nicholas of going to Italy and Turkey, but said these visits would not occur until the fall. Emperor Nicholas will go to these countries direct from the Crimea.

Repression in Russia.

London, Aug. 3.—A letter protesting against the unrelaxed repression of liberty in Russia is published here. It is addressed to Sir Edward Grey, the Secretary of Foreign Affairs, and asks whether it is impossible to bring friendly pressure upon the Russian Government to ameliorate the alleged conditions. The letter is signed by over 100 clergymen, newspapermen, members of the House of Commons and others.

The Times in an editorial on the letter denounces the choice of the day of arrival in British waters of Emperor Nicholas for the publication of such a letter, as bad taste and gratuitous boorishness.

Belleville Woman Drowned.

Belleville, Aug. 3.—At Bellingham, Wash., Mrs. Guy Higgins, aged 24, drowned whilst bathing. She was the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Stainton of Deseronto. The fatality occurred on the first anniversary of her wedding to Mr. Higgins, who is well-known in Belleville.

G.T.R. President in Canada.

Montreal, Aug. 3.—Sir Charles Rivers-Wilson, president of the Grand Trunk Railway, reached here yesterday and is the guest of C. M. Hays. Next week Sir Rivers will go west accompanied by the president and vice-president of the G.T.R.

Big Lockout in Mills.

Stockholm, Aug. 3.—The labor conflict in Sweden which originated in a dispute over wages in the woolen and cotton industries, is assuming large proportions.

In the beginning 13,000 men were locked out, and other industries since have become involved until today the employers' federation declared a lock-out of the iron foundry hands numbering 30,000 men. This brings the total of the men locked out to 80,000. A general strike is threatened for Aug. 4.

Firemen's Tournament.

Parry Sound, Aug. 3.—The annual tournament of the Northern Volunteer Firemen's Association will be held here on Wednesday. It is expected that at least 10,000 visitors will be present. Special trains are coming from all directions. Band competitions and various contests between volunteer fire companies have been arranged, as well as a big program of athletics. Capt. Alex. Gunn and Wm. Simpson of the Toronto fire department will act as judges.

Mob Lynchs Murderer.

St. Joseph, Mo., Aug. 3.—George Johnson (white), who murdered John W. Moore, a farmer, near Platte City, Mo., June 20, was lynched at Platte City early yesterday.

Two men took a third man to the jail, representing him to be a prisoner. When the sheriff opened the jail door the three overpowered him and after they had appeared and battered down the door of Johnson's cell.

Legion of Honor for Paderewski.

Paris, Aug. 3.—Ignace Paderewski, the Polish pianist, has been made an officer of the French Legion of Honor.
