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NAPIER DENISON ON EARTHQUAKES

Scientist Heard Last Night on Seismic Research by a Large Audience

"Victoria," said F. Napier Denison in his lecture on seismic research last night, at the Broad street hall, "is just far enough outside a great seismic zone to be safe from actual disaster, and just near enough to make it possible to measure from here, by the aids of the seismograph, the great forces at work in the interior of the earth. It is highly possible that were such operations extended here some important discoveries might be made. There is little doubt that from a seismic standpoint research work should be extended on this coast."

Mr. Denison spoke before a very large audience, the hall being very well filled. He illustrated his lecture with most interesting lantern slides showing earth formations and explaining in part how earthquakes are likely to occur. The lecture was given in language readily understood and not in scientific terminology. At the close of his able address a vote of thanks was tendered the speaker. The address was given under the auspices of the Natural History Society, and A. W. McCurdy occupied the chair.

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ADELAIDE FLOATED EARLY THIS MORNING

New Princess Sustained No Damage as Result of Her Grounding Last Night

Creeping her way into Puget Sound this evening about a 2 1/2 o'clock under a slow list in the midst of a blinding snowstorm, the new C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Hunter, ran ashore off Apple Cove point, and remained fast in the mud until 5 o'clock this morning when with her own steam she was successful in floating herself. The steamer proceeded to Seattle, arriving there at 6 o'clock.

The accident so early in the career of the latest addition to the C. P. R. is much regretted by shipping men of both Victoria and Vancouver, who felt she had been running just a week since being overhauled after her arrival from England, being on the night run between here and Vancouver for several trips. Fortunately no damage was done to the speedy vessel, as the bed of the sea where she grounded consists of a muddy substance.

The Adelaide left here late yesterday afternoon owing to her late arrival from Vancouver, and also to the fact that she had to take on bunker coal. She sailed at 5 30 o'clock, and after passing Port Townsend experienced a thick weather, snow falling very heavily.
