**MOST UNGALLANT OF PAPERS.**

Czech journalism has enriched the world with the novelty, *Mladene* (the weekly newspaper) to promote the emancipation of man from slavery to femininity. Incidentally it attacks the new woman movement and arraigns the girls and women of the period as incompetent in their proper sphere and insolent and tyrannical in the one that they have assumed.

In the opening number—only two or three have appeared—the editor of the *Bachelor* outlines his programme. He proposes to organize the unmarried men of the community into a solid phalanx to resist the evils by which women seek to lure them under their domination. In order to do this he proposes to turn the light upon the secret recesses of the female heart.

Special attention will be given to the education of the youngsters who come out of school and college and appear every day, totally unguarded against the traps and devices which the whole female sex has ready for them.

After the prospectus comes a spirited onslaught on the woman's rights movement. "Equal rights, indeed!" exclaims the writer. "The moment a woman wins equal rights she begins to clamor for something more." He says women are in the forefront of discontent. Things that have made men contented if not happy for generations become the subject of complaint the moment women attain them. Women demand as a right what men never thought of asking as a favor. They elbow the men out of their way and climb over them to secure what they consider their "equal rights"—that is, the right to more and better than anybody else.

The practical difficulty, the *Bachelor* feels, is the dilemma of the mere masculine person between the Scylla of marriage and the Charybdis of boarding house life. Women derive all their power from it. If it were not for the man's aspiration after an orderly home she would be his respectful servant. The *Bachelor* proposes the establishment of "asylums" for the unmarried. They are to be establishments in which men can take refuge when they have definitely made up their minds to a single life. They are to combine like privacy and comfort of the home with the independence of the club. No woman will be admitted except as the lowest grade of servants.

The inmates will have comfortable rooms well appointed and kept with any drain on their own mental resources. Their meals will be cooked as well as served and attractively as they would be in the home, and each man will have the option of taking over them or eating them in silence. Assuredly there will be no calls to make or visitors to receive—no irksome social duties, nothing to do to please a domestic tyrant, nothing that will make the man himself think right and enjoys. Of course it is not hoped that the plan will prevent all future marriages, but it will set up such a competition with married life that women will have to school themselves to a different conduct, and the worst features of man's subjection as it exists in present day marriage will disappear.

A large part of the sheet is given up to scolding over the shabby tricks that modern women play upon men. There is an old proverb: "Honor the woman; they spin and weave." What do they spin or weave today but intrigues, asks the *Bachelor*, and this is backed up with a string of stories of flirtation culled from the Bohemian newspapers and private letters and statements. The alleged fondness of the Bohemian women for students, lieutenants, actors and circus riders is especially dwelt on. One aggrieved wooer communicates the fact that his sweetheart writes to other men and eats from 30 to 40 cents worth of chocolate bonbons daily.

In the second number the editor prints selections from a vast number of letters that he says he has received approving his enterprise. One man ends rhapsodically: "Bachelors, go no more to dances. **SUPERIOR TO BRITISH INVINCIBLE**

The authentic details are now given of the new German armored cruiser which so much mystery has gathered during the past few months. Following the practice first introduced by the British Admiralty with the *Broadwing*, the naval authorities in Germany have maintained the strictest secrecy with regard to the minute details of their new ships, and the particulars of their new battleships—even the *Nassau*, which was launched last month—are still unknown outside the German Admiralty and a few officials at Wilhelmshaven.

A speed of 34 knots is to be attained. This is not to be the trial speed but the sea-going speed, and will, therefore make the speed quite as fast as the *Invincible*, which is designed for a trial speed of 28 knots. The German vessel, like the British, will be equipped with Parsons turbines, developing 44,000 horse-power, and she will be fitted for burning oil fuel as well as coal.

The 11-inch gun with which the ship will be armed, is a new weapon, and although it fires a shot lighter—some 80 lbs. than the British 12-inch gun, it is quite equal to it in fighting power, and at long ranges, such as modern naval engagements are fought at the advantage actually lies with the lighter German weapon.

The comparison of this ship with the British *Invincible* is as follows:

Displacement— <i>Invincible</i> , 17,250 tons; " " 18,000 tons.
Speed (knots)— <i>Invincible</i> , 25 (trial); " " 24 (service).
Armament— <i>Invincible</i> , eight 12-inch " " twelve 11-inch.
Broadside fire— <i>Invincible</i> , eight 12-inch; " " ten 11-inch.
Weight of broadside fire— <i>Invincible</i> , 6,500 lbs.; " " 7,800 lbs.
Weight of ahead and astern fire— <i>Invincible</i> , 5,100 lbs.; " " 6,030 lbs.

Ahead and astern fire—*Invincible*, six 12-inch; " " eight 11-inch.

It will be seen that the German vessel is superior all round and her advantages are increased by the fact that her armor belt is eight inches thick to the British ship's seven inches.

The "P" (she has not yet received her name) is to be ready for sea by the end of next year.

**CHINA TO HAVE ARMY OF 40,000,000 MEN**

A Frenchman who has been making a study of the Chinese army, warns Europe that it is not inconceivable that within ten years China may be able to oppose the white nations of the world a thoroughly drilled, and equipped force of 40,000,000 of soldiers. It is quite certain, he thinks, that it will have the biggest army in the world—at least 6,000,000 men ready to mobilize at short notice and equal in courage, drill and equipment to any European troops.

This 6,000,000 minimum is provided for by present plans. The increase to the maximum figure means nothing but a little more effort—a draft on the wealth of a population which is trivalent when spread this over so vast an empire. The writer fears that, stimulated by their own remarkable performances in army making up to date, the Chinese rulers may make a change in their plans at any time and may do it without taking Europe into their confidence.

The new Chinese army had its inception about 1890 when the late Marshal Ma issued an order abolishing the red umbrellas which the Chinese soldiers used to take into the field with them. Ma was an able organizer, and the sort of soldiers that were produced under his management were revealed to Occidentals in 1900, when the capture of the Taku forts took place.

Fighting Chinese soldiers previous to that encounter had been little better than massacres; but the defenders of the Taku forts and those of Tientsin and of Chan Hai Kuan, armed with modern rifles and having Armstrong and Krupp cannon, fought not only with desperate bravery, but with discipline. They gave pretty nearly as good account of themselves as an equal number of European troops would have done.

When China caught her breath in 1900 she realized that these were the only sort of troops worth having. Rejecting the plan submitted by her British adviser, Sir Robert Hart, for the creation of a miniature army of four divisions to be developed in the course of ten years, the Gen. Hing Pu, or council of war, boldly adopted a scheme of evolution which would seem startling in any country.

It contemplated the creation of twenty army corps of two divisions each, each division comprising two brigades of infantry, a regiment of artillery and one of cavalry, a battalion of engineers and a battalion of supply train. Each brigade was to be composed of four regiments of three battalions of 300 men each.

A scheme of local recruiting was adopted with a period of active service of nine years, to be followed by seven years of reserve with a month's drill each year. The creation of twenty army corps of two divisions each, each division comprising two brigades of infantry, a regiment of artillery and one of cavalry, a battalion of engineers and a battalion of supply train. Each brigade was to be composed of four regiments of three battalions of 300 men each.

There is a fair supply of field and mountain artillery and the supply of Krupp siege guns is steadily increasing. There are 7,000 cadets at present in the military schools, and 900 pupil officers, as they are called, are receiving higher instruction in ordnance, strategy and tactics at four superior schools. A military academy which is to occupy somewhat the position of our own war college is being organized in Peking.

The Frenchman estimates that the expenses of the army on a basis of a million active and seven million reserve soldiers will not involve an increased burden of more than 6 cents a head on the population of China. Even so poor a people, he thinks, can stand this, and the Government and people have grown so proud of the army that he sees no hope of any slackening in its development. "This is the real yellow peril," is the conclusion that he draws.
