Very Little Business Now for These Officers to Look After

The decline in importance of the work of the Board of Port Wardens is shown in their annual report submitted to the Common Council yesterday. The number of surveys held and the cash receipts have fallen off immensely from what they were in the days of the wooden ship building here.

The report is as follows:—  
To His Worship, the Mayor, and members of the Common Council of the City of St. John:  
Gentlemen,—In accordance with the corporation by-law passed the 14th day of May, 1876, to regulate the Board of Port Wardens, that board begs to report that during the year ending 31st Dec., 1908, they held 62 surveys, and issued 19 certificates, amounting to \$285.50.

### COUNCIL CONTINUES THIS AFTERNOON

Recommendations of Salaries Committee Likely to Cause Lively Discussion.

The common council will meet this afternoon at three o'clock in the court house to resume the consideration of business left over from yesterday. Owing to the volume of business and the discussion that is expected over various matters it is possible that another meeting may be necessary, to clean off the slate.

Among the business left over by the common council yesterday was a communication from the board of fire commissioners asking that the council take up the matter of arranging for the installation of automatic fire sprinklers in the grain elevator at West St. John.

The report of the salaries committee submitted to the common council yesterday afternoon is causing considerable comment around town. While some of the increases are regarded as justifiable it is felt that the recommendations include some increases that are not necessary and that it is proposed to give some of the employees considerably more than their services in a like capacity would command anywhere else. The opinion is expressed that in order to get rid of the matter without embarrassment to themselves the committee have recommended more than they expect with the idea that the whole report will be thrown out by the council.
