## GEORGE WARD LOSES A LEG IN ACCIDENT

The falling of heavy weights connected with the elevator caused serious and painful injury to George Ward at H. Horton and Son's establishment yesterday afternoon, while a number of others on the elevator at the time were badly shaken up. Mr. Ward was quite badly crushed, necessitating the amputation of the left leg above the ankle. The hospital authorities shated last evening that he was doing as nicely as could be expected.

The firm were having repairs made to the elevator by E. S. Stephenson and Company, machinists. Through the suggestion of the machinist in charge Mr. Ward went aboard the elevator to test its working. He was desirous of seeing that everything had been working satisfactory. Prior to the accident the machinist boarded the elevator on the third floor. When theelevator was descending to the basement it was stopped at the second floor at the request of one of the clerks, who was taken aboard. Upon leaving the second floor the elevator contained three of the clerks besides the machinist. The test worked well until the elevator reached the basement floor.
