Literary Note.

The July number of the "Smart Set"
keeps up the fast pace set by the
June issue, which was the first num-
ber put out since the magazine passed
into the hands of John Adams Thayer.
The contents page presents a brilliant
array of names of some of the leading
writers of both this country and Eng-
land, and there are some new ones.
The leading feature, the complete
novel, is the work of Alexander Otis,
and bears the pleasant summer-resort
title of "Copsewood-by-the-Sea." It
tells of a discontented wife, whose
husband, acting on advice of counsel,
attempts to divert her by inducing a
friend to write her an anonymous
love note. She falls for it—and
things begin to happen. The whole
town, summer boarders, oldest resi-
dents, passing tourists, embryo law-
yers, and Mohitabel, a horse afflicted
with the wanderlust, get into the pic-
ture and fit across the scene in a
merry mass of mix-ups to a rollicking
tune of farce that makes mighty plea-
sant summer reading.
In "His Lost Bohemia" F. Berkeley
Smith has written a delightful tale of
the Latin Quarter—not the usual story
of carefree students, jealous grisettes
and wild revelry, but a picture of the
modernized, commercialized, utterly
spoiled Quarter, where So-and-so's Co-
coa staves you in the face from a
dozen signboards and the old-time stu-
dio feasts have degenerated into mere
dressed-up, ice-cream-and-cake high-
brow musicals.

The Telephone Hearing
Goes Over For a WeekProceedings at Yesterday Morning's Session of the Investiga-
tion into the Affairs of the N. B. Telephone Co.—After-
