TO USE HYPNOTISM TO RECALL MEMORY

Dr. Robert M. Rodgers Hopes to Bridge Break in the Lawyers Mind by Use of Science.

New York, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Dr. Robert M. Rodgers, No. 649 Prospect place, Brooklyn, said last night he would employ suggestion and hypnosis in his treatment of James Howard, of No. 113 Gates avenue, Brooklyn, who since he was injured in a trolley car accident on Oct. 21, has lost all recollection of events which have occurred in the last two years and a half.

Dr. Rodgers hopes that his patient while in a hypnotic state may regain his memory through the association by suggestion of recent and remote events of a similar nature. This falling the physician fears Mr. Howard's mind may remain blank.

Mr. Howard is suffering from hysterical amnesia, said Dr. Rodgers last night. "His case is peculiar and might be considered hopeless. I have confidence in the power of hypnotic suggestion in his condition, however, and as soon as his nerves respond to the treatment I have prescribed for him I shall certainly attempt to cure his mental derangement by this method."

Mr. Howard was a young lawyer with a good practice until he was disabled in June, 1909, on complaint of William T. Jerome, when district attorney of New York county. He worked greatly over his misfortune, and became absent minded.

While alighting from a trolley car in Fulton street on Oct. 21, he fell and injured his head. Since then he has been confined to his bed and talks incoherently of taking an appeal from the adverse decision in his case. Dr. Rodgers has to be introduced repeatedly to his patient, who imagines that Theodore Roosevelt is still a supreme court justice. He reads the daily papers with apparent understanding, except as to facts that have a bearing on events which have occurred since he was injured.

SCHOOL GIRL SHOT IN ROW WITH BOY

Marjorie Wood, Seventeen Years Old, is Found Dying in Road at South Norwalk, Conn.

South Norwalk, Nov. 10.—Following the shooting, Miss Marjorie Wood, seventeen years old and one of the prettiest girls here, was found dying in the road just outside of the village late this afternoon, with a gunshot wound in her neck and chest.

Frederick Brandage passed in his automobile and picked the girl up, but she died before he got her to the hospital.

Timothy O'Neill, a student at the local high school, was one of the companions of the girl at the time of the shooting and was arrested tonight. His gun, which had been discharged, was found behind the wall near the place where the girl was picked up, and it was thought that she had been shot from ambush.

O'Neill was denied in his own home at first he lacked all knowledge of the shooting, but later admitted he had been responsible for it, declaring that it was accidental. He said that with a companion he was walking behind two girls and that while demonstrating the action of the gun it was accidentally discharged, tearing the wound in the girl's neck.

He declares that he then became frightened, threw the gun away and ran home with the other boy and girl. Dr. S. H. Huntington, the medical examiner, asserts that Miss Wood was shot from the front and has placed the case in the hands of C. E. Wilson, the coroner.

According to Hazel Evans, fifteen years old, who was with Miss Wood at the time of the shooting, the two girls had been in the woods gathering nuts.

TRY THESE RECIPES TO COOK POTATOES

Potato Omelet. Grate three mealy belted potatoes. Beat in the yolks of three eggs, adding three tablespoons of milk, one-half a teaspoonful of salt, a pinch of white pepper, and a tablespoon of chopped parsley, and at the last minute the beaten whites, mixing it all as lightly as possible. Put a tablespoon of butter in the frying pan and as it boils pour in the omelet. Let it brown on the bottom, working the turnips under so as to let the uncooked part run down under. When brown enough, put in the oven and cook until a knife blade, if run in, will come out clean. Then it will not fall. Serve like a plain omelet.

Chantilly Potatoes. Prepare some nicely seasoned light mashed potatoes and mound on a platter. Beat one-half cup cream until stiff, add one-half cup soft cheese grated and seasoned with salt and pepper. Pile lightly onto the potato and set on the top grate of the oven until the surface is nicely browned. Be sure that the oven is very hot.

Mix with a pint of cold boiled mashed potatoes two tablespoonsful of flour, to which has been added one teaspoonful of baking powder. Add the yolks of four eggs, a half cup of milk, a pinch of salt, and, lastly, the beaten whites. Bake on hot greased griddle like buck-wheat cakes. If the dough runs add a little more flour; if too thick a little more milk. Serve hot. These are delicious.

Pressed Potatoes. Wash peel and boil in salted water about eight potatoes. When done drain and dry over the fire for a moment. Take each potato and press it firmly in a cloth to give a round shape. Place in a buttered baking dish, pour over a half pint of stock, put a piece of butter on each potato, season with salt and pepper and bake in the oven until the potatoes have absorbed the stock.

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AGED COUPLE DIE ON GOLDEN WEDDING DAY

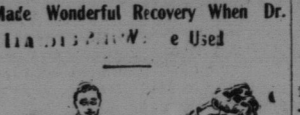
James Aubrey, of New York, Finds His Parents Asphyxiated on Arriving for Celebration.
