ST. CROIX LEADS THE LEAGUE; FREDERICTON TRIMS BANGOR; GREEKS WIN ONE, AND LOSE A GAME

Marathons, 2; Bangor, 1. A fair crowd of spectators witnessed on Monday afternoon one of the best games of ball that has been seen on the North End grounds this season. The game was between the Marathons and the Bangor team and was won by the Greeks by a score of two to one. It was a hard fought game from start to finish and proved a pitcher's battle throughout.

McMillan was the twirler for the visitors and his work was all that could be desired. The Marathons being only able to find time for five safe hits. For seven innings only three hits were made off him and then came the eighth when two hits were made off him and these mingled with errors gave the Greeks the two runs. McMillan was not to blame for losing his game as he certainly pitched winning ball, and with exception of one error by first baseman Reed, he was given perfect support.

Joe Tarbell was on the mound for the Marathons and he pitched about the best game that he has worked in this season. Bangor managed to make eight hits off Wabawik but he was backed up with good support and the one hour and 38 minutes of baseball was fully enjoyed by all present.

As usual after being passed by without a run being made it had all the appearance of working into an extra inning game without any scores being made.

It was not until the fourth inning that a Marathons reached as far as second base and he got no farther. Another Greek reached the second base in the sixth, but one reached first in the seventh, and then came the eighth inning when the first man in the game crossed the plate and the Marathons won the game. Fredericton got two runs in the fourth when Ganley was safe on the first bunt down the third base line crossing the bag as Wakefield picked up the ball. Dugan drew a base on balls. Stone laid down another perfect bunt, Ganley racing all the way home from second, while Dugan was molested and Dugan scored on Bob Conley's sacrifice fly to his brother, Larry.

Ganley's playing was the feature of the game, he having three hits and a base on balls in four trips to the plate, also three stolen bases and coming home from second on a bunt, Bangor's fast double play, started by Connaughton, and catches of fly balls by Bob Conley and White, were the other features. Umpire Keeler had a troublesome afternoon both sides kicking up his decision on balls and strikes as well as in other departments. The Bangor team looks a lot stronger than ever before and fit to battle with Marathons in the game. This is how it happened:
