National League Begins April 14

New York, Feb. 10.—With a playing schedule of 164 games the National League baseball season of 1920 will begin on Wednesday, April 14 and close on Sunday, October 3. The initial games of the present race have been arranged as follows: Boston at New York; Philadelphia at Brooklyn; Pittsburgh at St. Louis and Chicago at Cincinnati. The other half of the circuit will have the opening games on Thursday, April 22 with Cincinnati at Chicago; St. Louis at Philadelphia; Brooklyn at Philadelphia and New York at Boston. In the five cities where baseball can be played on Sundays the visiting clubs have been well taken care of. In the distribution of games white noise of them has been overlooked in the allotment of Saturday and holiday games. There are only four conflicting dates in the entire schedule. These are May 9; June 27, September 5 and 15 on each of which the Chicago National and American League Clubs will be playing at home.

TYPHOID REACHES EPIDEMIC STAGE IN SOUTHERN GALICIA

Warsaw, Feb. 9.—Red Cross officials have been asked by the Polish government to rush doctors into Southern Galicia, where typhoid fever is raging in epidemic form. It is stated by M. Desmayo, a member of the Chamber of Deputies, that the people of Eastern Galicia are literally dying out, there being several villages in that district which are left without a single survivor. Since the epidemic began, it is stated 100,000 deaths have occurred.

Norway Given Sovereignty Over Setzberger Archipelago

Paris, Feb. 9.—The treaty by which Norway is given sovereignty over the Setzberger archipelago was signed in the clock hall of the Foreign Ministry at 4.30 o'clock this afternoon.

Poland's Attitude in Accord With Allies Regarding Soviets

Washington, Feb. 9.—The Hurvud-Studenlubi, today prints a statement credited to official Polish quarters stating that Poland's attitude towards Soviet Russia will be in accord with that of the Allies. No peace will be accepted by which the Soviets merely obtained material advantages and Poland will insist on strong moral guarantees, the statement says.

SYDNEY FANS WON HALIFAX COIN

Matched Race Between Prince Rupert and Baron A Proved Exciting Five-Heat Contest.

Sydney, N. S., Feb. 11.—Before 3,000 people, who thronged North Sydney harbor this afternoon, Prince Rupert, owned by Lemoine Brothers, of North Sydney, won a five-heat race from Baron A, the Halifax pacer. Upwards of \$3,000 changed hands on the race. Baron A. cupped the first heat with an apparent ease, and Prince Rupert looked very bad in the opener. When the North Sydney pacer won the second heat in a hard, close finish, the odds switched, and when the third heat went to the Lemoine entry, everyone expected the big bay pacer to win with ease in the next. However, Baron A. came back strong in the fourth heat and won without turning a hair. The fifth heat was the best of the afternoon and the horses raced neck and neck until about fifty yards from the wire, when Prince Rupert showed a surprising burst of speed and landed in front.

Next week, if arrangements can be completed, the North Sydney Driving Club intends to stake a free-for-all sweepstake race with seven or eight starters. The entrance fee will be placed at \$100. In addition, the North Sydney Club will give \$100 to the purse. If this scheme goes through, the horses will race for the largest purse ever offered for an ice race in the Maritime Provinces.

Upper Canadian Hockey Games
