## FARMER STANDS SUPREME IN THE WORLD AND COURTED BY ALL

Capital and Labor Begging for His Support; Neither Gets It and Farm Bloc Remains in United States Dictating to Law Makers.

Washington, Jan. 31.—The farmer remains a force, not only in the Congress but in the nation. In the conference, capital and labor played for his support. Neither got it. The farmer, however, will play one or the other as suits his purpose and serves his end. The administration turned him back squarely into the Republican party. In response to the two votes upon the burden which labor should bear in the definition of the farmer's position, the committee on prices, in a report, brought in a report upon transportation costs. It was a committee controlled by those capitalistically inclined. It would have the farmer pay for the cost of transportation. In general it would throw the burden of cost reduction upon labor. The committee had little success for invading this field for there was a committee on transportation, whose business it was to report upon cutting freight rates.  
Mr. Gorman from the defense of labor. The farmers gave him their attention. They agreed with him. By a large majority they recommended the report. They decided to let themselves be used as part of the propaganda to cut wages.

Some people tell me that the farmer is essentially a capitalist and that his interests are with the capitalists. Others prove to you that politically the farmer will never count, being in the minority and not acting with labor in the industrial cities. The farmer does not see it either way. He preserves his independence. He is the reason that in a democracy it is not the majority that has its way so often as the organized minority. He is part of an organized minority, a bloc. And that is what he has voted to remain. He is politically self-conscious. The success of the bloc in Congress has made him confident.
