In the light of the disclosure by the Bank of Canada that the chartered banks are rapidly reducing their lending, and that loans were off by \$20 million in one week alone, does the government intend to impose this tight money situation on all the regions of Canada equally, regardless of the economic conditions which face them?

ADDITION TO FUTURE DELIVERIES OF SHORTFALL IN QUOTAS
