WRONG BODY ARRIVED
Grand Rapids, Mich., Nov. 17.—When the Hagerman case was supposed to contain the body of John T. Westerhof, the Grand Rapids soldier who was killed in northern Russia, was opened today at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Westerhof, it was found to contain the body of some other soldier.

RADIAL BY-LAW CARRIED
Beck's Policy Heartily Endorsed at the Polls Yesterday

WHITBY, Nov. 18.—Ratepayers of this city yesterday at the polls declared themselves in favor of the policy of Sir Adam Beck and his Hydro policy by a vote of 8 to 1.

The vote in favor of the Hydro-radial line from Toronto to Bowmanville, through the Lake Shore towns, was 347 to 43. West Whitby township carried the by-law by 138 to 22. Even those who had voted against the project fell into the spirit of jubilation which was manifested by the people last night.

A by-law providing for the erection of a new school and the rebuilding of one now in use at an expenditure of \$80,000 was also carried. Another by-law providing for the granting of a concession to a new industry was defeated.

Jimmy Wilde, British flyweight champion who recently arrived in New York, will make his first appearance in the ring against Joe Sharkey of New York, on December 6, at Milwaukee, if plan, announced by Otto Borchert, president of an athletic club of Milwaukee are carried out.

Borchert said Wilde had agreed to fight before his club for \$11,000.

Stencoe Jury's Verdict.
The evidence given at the resumed inquest into the death of the late Homer Waffle, who was killed in the cockpit of the wheelhouse of the Wolf Stock Co.'s plant at Simcoe on Monday of last week, showed conclusively that there was no ground for the rumors of suicide that had been circulated concerning him.

Cost of Milk at Chatham.
At the regular session of the Fair Price Committee to investigate the price of milk, cream, and ice cream sold in Chatham, the milk producers submitted figures showing that it costs \$2.88 to produce 100 pounds of milk. This average was based on cows giving six thousand pounds of milk per annum. There was considerable discussion which at times became quite heated.

Two Calls Sustained By Guelph Presbytery.
At the regular meeting of Guelph Presbytery, held in Knox Church Guelph, yesterday morning and largely attended, the call of Captain the Rev. G. McDonald, Chaplain of Sproedwell Hospital, to Knox Church Elora, was sustained. His induction will take place on the evening of December 4 at 7.30 o'clock. The Moderator, Rev. J. L. Small of Hespeler will preside. The preacher will be Rev. Mr. McLennan of Kitchener, Captain the Rev. J. B. Paulin of Toronto will address the people, and Captain the Rev. A. Little of Guelph will address the pastor.

The Presbytery also received a call from Hawkesville and Linwood to Rev. Mr. McLean of Toronto, which was sustained, and arrangements will be made for the induction. The Hawkesville and Linwood pulpits have been vacant for some time. The Budget Committee recommended the acceptance by the Guelph Presbytery of an allocation of \$41,000 for missionary work, the recommendation being adopted.

Rev. K. J. McDonald of Galt made an extensive report on the work of the Forward Movement of the Presbyterian Church.

A resolution of sympathy to Rev. Dr. MacGillivray on the death of his brother, Rev. A. H. MacGillivray of Hamilton, was passed.

Attending to-day's meeting was Rev. R. A. Mitchell of North Homan China.

Galt Poultry and Pet Show.
The twelfth annual exhibition of Galt Poultry and Pet Stock Association opened last night with 967 poultry, rabbits and pigeons on exhibition. The show is one of the best ever held there, with all classes well filled and the quality of exhibits of the best. Awards were placed to-day by J. H. Minshall of Brantford in poultry and rabbits, T. J. Killey, London, in bantams, and A. Martin, Galt in pigeons. The show continues Wednesday and Thursday.

Woodstock Chief Returns.
Chief Killing, former Chief of Police of Woodstock, who recently returned from overseas, resumed his duties as Chief this morning. He enlisted in March, 1916 with the 168th Battalion, and had been overseas continuously until a few weeks ago. His return to the force is welcomed by a large number of friends. He wishes Deputy Chief Moore to be retained on the force, as he thinks the Woodstock Police Force inadequate.
