

"If, for instance, you volunteer at the soup kitchen or the Boys and Girls club, it really provides a sense of purpose and meaning."

It also helps those you work with. 'Peers are often the most effective helpers for a whole range of things. For example, here at the university, with peer helpers and Men Against Sexual Agression," Luck said. "It's making a contribution."
