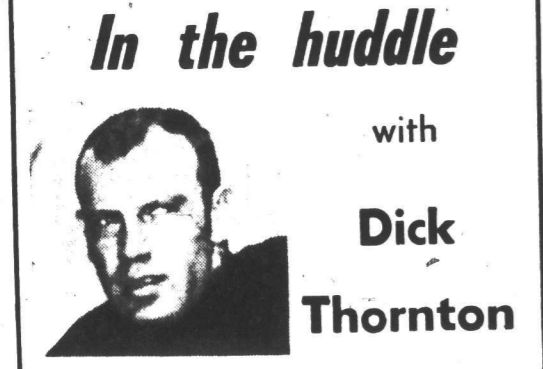
1st DIVISION PEEWEE

All our contact drills are recorded on film and then scrutinized by the coaches in order to evaluate the personnel.
Ten days ago the Argos began with a roster of 62 ballplayers, but that number has been declining rapidly. Some rookies see the handwriting on the wall, pack their bags and disappear; others just can't take the punishment and the rest are released as the squad trims down slowly to the 32-man limit.

Some interesting and crazy things always happen in camp and this year is no exception.

As time flies by, the pace gets slower and slower as more time is devoted to rest and sleep. We adhere to a rigid schedule and only have about five hours of free time a day in which to resume an ordinary existence.
A big duel is on for the starting quarterback slot between Tommy Wilkinson and Don Jonas, and a new receiver, Tom Bland, has been impressive with his speed and hands. Jim Corrigan continues to maul ballcarriers and will be a great one.
It seems like we have been up here for a month and already we play for real tonight against the Ottawa Roughriders. It's about time we start taking a shot at somebody else besides our own teammates.
On the weekend we leave for our Western swing to Edmonton and Vancouver and it won't be long before the opening league game is upon us.

LONDON — Wayne McDonald of Lorne Park had his problems with his putter at the Canadian Open here at the London Hunt Club throughout the entire Open but Mississauga's Ben Kern had even more problems.
Kern, after a first-round 73 had left him eight strokes back of the leader, ballooned to a 76 and missed the cut by two strokes.

The tremendous conglomeration of rollers at incredible low scores after the first two rounds had forced officials to lower the cut off mark to 147. Kern, a first-year pro who has been having a fair season on the pro tour but encountered more than his share of bad luck on the tough Hunt club course.
McDonald just survived the cut with a 147 after two rounds and went on to post rounds of 72 and 75 to finish with 294. He finished 15 strokes back of Open champ, Kermit Zarley of the U.S. Rival stars Nick Westlock had 289 and Gary Cowan posted a 289 also after a horrible 79 on his last round.
