HUNDREDS OF NATIVES DEAD

Victims of Rubber Squeezing Raids in the Congo Free State.

900 Slaughtered by one Expedition and 800 by Another—Endless Barbarities Cause a Reign of Terror.

London, Nov. 7.—Edgar Canisius, an American who recently retired from the employ of the Congo Free State, confirms the terrible stories told about the condition of the natives especially in the portions termed the state domain, where strangers are seldom admitted.

Canisius, who accompanied Major Lechmere, commander of the Belgian troops in the Congo on his earlier expedition after rubber, says nine hundred natives were killed in six weeks during that expedition, while a smaller expedition, commanded by a Belgian lieutenant, killed 300 natives in three weeks.

The district is practically under martial law, on the strength of which endless barbarities are committed, that the natives are absolutely terror-stricken. Canisius further declares that the so-called punitive expeditions are in reality rubber-squeezing raids conducted with such inequitable methods that the natives are in a constant state of revolt.

While the conditions are somewhat improved in the territories worked by the concession companies, the lot of the natives in the state domain Canisius declares, is far worse than before the advent of the whites. The natives are practically forced to work rubber at the muzzle of rifles, receiving two cents per pound for what is sold at 75 cents at Antwerp. Thousands of natives have died in the bush and live like wild animals. Along the jungle paths the bodies of those who have died of starvation are frequent sights.

Mr. Canisius, who comes from Illinois, was recently a resident of Washington.

SPEEDILY END THE CAMPAIGN

The British Government is Considering Plans More Cavalry to Be Sent out.

Mr. Chamberlain Believes the end of the Struggle is Approaching—Roberts "Boo-hoed," Buller Cheered.

London, Nov. 7.—The meetings of the British Cabinet recently have been chiefly devoted to South Africa, and to drawing up plans for more strenuous efforts to end the campaign. One of the immediate results will be the despatch of four thousand cavalry from England to South Africa.

THE END APPROACHING.
London, Nov. 7.—Presiding yesterday afternoon at the presentation of a sword of honor sent from Australia, to Major-General Baden-Powell, the defender of Mafeking, Mr. Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, said now that the long struggle in South Africa is approaching its termination, neither the country nor the government had any right or wish to make any settlement which would render futile the sacrifices which had been made.

CHEERS FOR BULLER.
London, Nov. 7.—At Nottingham today, where Lord Roberts, the commander-in-chief, distributed a thousand war medals, he was repeatedly "boo-hoed," and cheers were raised for Gen. Buller. The recipients of the medals, at the luncheon subsequently given in their honor, repeatedly broke into cheers for Gen. Buller.

NO CONFIRMATION.
Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The Dominion Government has as yet no information confirming the cable from London, England, that a contingent of cavalry had been accepted from Canada for duty in South Africa. Both the Militia and the State departments say that the first thing they heard of the matter was when they saw it in the press. Hon. Mr. Borden said that he did not know anything about it.
