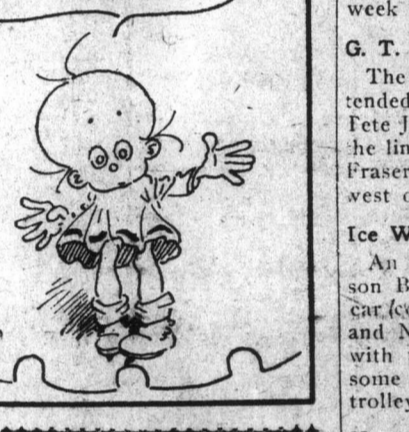

SENATE HISSED

Labor Men Show Regard For Laurier's Supporters To-Day.

MONTREAL, Sept. 23.—"Irresponsible parliamentarians," was the term applied to the senate by Dr. J. G. Shearer, of Toronto, secretary of the social service council of Canada in addressing the Labor Congress to-day. Dr. Shearer made caustic comment on the action of the senate in killing certain legislative measures which the council with the co-operation of the trades and labor congress attempted to put through and succeeded in getting passed by the house. "Cries of 'rotten' and hisses for the senate greeted Dr. Shearer's statements as to what the senate had not done to obtain better protection for the employed girls and women, to save them from the 'white slavers' and prevent their seduction by their employers. Projected legislation for the improvement of industrial, economic and sanitary conditions in the larger cities of the Dominion which are now being investigated by the council were discussed briefly by the speaker. His statement that the council had declared for the initiative and referendum and other masters supported by the Socialists and Labor men was greeted with cheering.

The rate of wages for threshermen ranges from \$3 to \$3.50 per day and in spite of all efforts put forth by the provincial bureau of labor it is impossible to meet demands.

SOCIETY LEADER SUED FOR A MILLION

Mrs. Clarence Mackay is Unenviable Notoriety Legal Proceedings

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—A. Blake, wife of the noted New York surgeon, has served Mrs. H. Mackay, wife of the president of the Postal Telegraph company, with the necessary papers for \$1,000,000 for alienation of her husband's affections.
