LABOR REPORT

Conditions in Brantford During July as Told in Gazette.

The following is the report of labor conditions in Brantford during July as told, in the Labor Gazette, Ottawa:

"Labor conditions were not improved generally over the conditions existing in June. There was a surplus of labor in nearly all trades. The erection of a new school and a new factory found work for more employed. The civic authorities were continuing the sewer work, and applications were still being received."

The work at Long Bridge preparatory to raising it was being continued, and a new bridge to span the Grand River for the Lake Erie and Northern Railway was commenced.

A factory has been commenced in which silk manufacturing will be carried on, the cost of erection being \$35,000.

The Stone works, which was closed down for some time for alterations to machinery has resumed operation. Short time was general in the factories and a large number of men were idle.

The strike of painters was ended, the men returning to work during the month. Tenders have been called for the erection of a government building at Burford.

Agriculturists were busy. Haymaking and wheat harvest progressing. The wheat in some sections was reported good, and in others fair. Rain was badly needed for the market gardens. The army worm caused a lot of damage.

Railroad construction was active. The application made by the Lake Erie and Northern Railway to the Railway Commission. The Company wished to alter the position of its station here.

Expect Turkey to Make War

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—The British embassy has been informed by a cable from London that Germany has agreed to leave Constantinople to take charge of the Turkish army, and that a declaration of war from Turkey was expected. Plans are already under way to ask the American ambassador at Constantinople to take charge of British interests there.

The Turkish ambassador, A. Ruge, has expressed a doubt to-day that the Turkish army was mobilizing and about to fight on the side of Germany. He said the Turkish army was mobilized three weeks ago.

THIS LOOKS LIKE WAR. ROME, Sept. 1.—Seventy-two superior German officers forming the German military mission at Constantinople, have been incorporated in the Turkish army and will participate in the war.

The presence of the German officers in the army is interpreted to mean that Turkey will fight on the side of Germany.

All Protest Against Sale

[By Special Wire to the Courier] WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—Expressions from each of the powers of the Triple Entente that they would regard with disfavor the purchase of German steamers for use as transport ships by the German merchant marine were before Administration officials for consideration to-day. Great Britain, France and Russia state that an immediate prohibition would be placed at the disposal of the Germans through the transfer of marooned German steamers to the United States. It was suggested, however, by the German government that if the Washington Government bought an equal number of ships from each of the belligerents there would be no complications was seen nevertheless in questions that might arise over cargoes carried on the American ships, which Administration officials have asserted the proposed shipping line would handle only those cargoes defined as not contraband, yet the ambassadors of the allies expressed the belief that their governments would raise objections even to conditional contraband, that would tend to restrict purchases with the belligerents.

"We have not yet settled about the purchases," was Secretary Bryan's only comment on the question.

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SPAIN IS UNEASY

Government is in Accord With Britain—British Officers Visit Coast.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—A cable from Madrid to The Tribune says: Although the attitude of the Spanish Government is officially one of the most strict neutrality, it is clear that the sympathy in the official world is in favor of the advanced elements. But it is also apparent that Germany has the sympathy of a large number of Spaniards, who seen in a German party organized two demonstrations that were quickly suppressed by the government, whose actions are the object of comment.

It is known that despite the declaration that Spain will be neutral the last officers in the army and navy who were on leave of absence have been ordered to join their colors. The artillery placed there and of Biscay have been reinforced. A large force of engineers, has been sent to the Balearic Islands, and it is open secret that a number of British officers have visited nearly all the coast defenses.

Queen Elizabeth of Belgium and her children, who arrived in London last night, are to-day the guests of Lord Curzon.

A news despatch from The Hague says the four richest men of Belgium have guaranteed to pay 100,000,000 francs of the war tax of \$40,000,000 levied against the Belgium capital.

News despatches published in London say that the people of Berlin, alarmed at the Russian advance, are beginning to turn their backs to neutral countries. The capital for neutral countries.

The Prince of Wales relief fund is approaching the \$10,000,000 mark.

POSITION IS GOOD. PARIS, Sept. 1.—The position of the allied armies, according to the opinion of French military experts, is good. The Germans, it is pointed out, are attempting a movement which, if it failed, will leave them in a dangerous situation with their troops exhausted. The British army, fresh and rested, the experts say, is about to engage the German extreme right, and to support the French who have been retiring slowly for several days.
