Ottawa, July 22f-There will be no public holiday in Canada for coronation day, August 9th, but royal salutes will be fired at Victoria and other saluting stations throughout the Dominion.

An officer of the Royal Garrison Artillery will have charge, assisted by the sergeant instructor of the same force.

The revenue for Chinese immigration to Canada for the year ending June 30th amounts to \$364,972, compared with \$178,704 during the previous year. The poll tax last year was increased from \$50 to \$100. The number who paid the tax was 2,525, compared with 2,518 in 1901.
