## Knox Wins by Narrow Majority.

Both By-Laws Defeated.

A Hot Contest and a Large Vote Polled.

The municipal elections in Havelock were very warmly contested, the main fight of course, being for the reeve-ship, but the contest among the candidates for the Council and the School Board, was also anything but mild.

Reeve Knox succeeded in retaining his civic power, being elected by 20 of a majority over S. S. Joyce, which the latter attributes to the active antagonism of the old Council, the assessors, constable and sundry others.

Messrs. Phillips and Young of the old Council were re-elected and the other two members for 1910 are Messrs. John Toman and Wm. Weese.

For the School Board, Messrs Falkner and Kindred were re-elected and the new member is Edw. Fennell.

Both by-laws were defeated by small majorities, the ratepayers deciding that they do not want either of these necessary civic improvements. The vote in detail was as follows:

The usual speaking was held in the town hall in the evening, when the successful candidates returned thanks and the disappointed ones told how it happened. Mr. Joyce explained the many difficulties he had had to contend with and stated that he would demand a recount and also seek to disqualify Councillor elect Phillips, because the latter had been paid, as one of the firm of Phillips Bros., accounts for merchandise, during 1909. Mr. Joyce's contention concerning this matter is apt to be lightly thought of, because it is no way affects Mr. Phillips' qualifications for 1910.

Reeve Knox, in speaking of the by-laws, thought that they had not been voted on on their merits, but that the municipal contest had affected the issue and was responsible for their defeat, which was to be regretted. In future, Reeve Knox thought, by-laws should be voted on at some other time than municipal election day.

## Provincial Convention Postponed

The Provincial Convention of Conservatives for reorganizing the party, which was to have been held on Jan. 11th, has been postponed until next fall, probably during Toronto Exhibition. It was felt that it would be better to postpone it until after the Dominion convention next summer in order that the other party's policy as decided upon then may come before the Provincial convention.

## The Township Election.

Reeve Jas. Russell Re-Elected.

Messrs. Griffith, McConnell, Wilde and Kitchen The Council for 1910.

The election in Belmont and Methuen on Monday was an exciting one. Every effort was made to get out a big vote and when the results were announced Reeve Russell was found re-elected by a majority of 142 over his opponent, Mr. Jos. Johnston.

For the councillors, Messrs. Kitchen and McCutcheon had a tight run for fourth place, the former winning out by two votes.
