EDUCATIONAL REFORM THE NEED OF THE HOUR!

In none of the public services has the Murray-Daniels Government shown such unprogressiveness as in the administration of public instruction. The system of free schools was established in this Province by the administration of the Hon. Dr. Charles Tupper, in 1864.

The passing of the Free School Act of that year marked a great epoch in the history of Nova Scotia. In its frank recognition of the duty of the state to care for the education of all classes of the people, rich and poor, Nova Scotia's Free School Act was one of the pioneer measures of reform in the British world.

No Attempt to Modernize

But it is obvious that a system of public instruction which met the needs of Nova Scotians in 1864, falls short of the requirements of 1916. In the past half century the history of education the world over has been of steady development to meet new conditions. But the government of Nova Scotia has been content to mark time. For thirty-three years the schools of this Province have been administered by Liberal governments. For 20 years they have been in the hands of the Hon. George H. Murray and his associates. Throughout this entire period there has been no intelligent attempt to modernize or improve the system of 1864 or to adapt its administration to present day conditions.

Inferior Common School Product.

The result is that the comment is often heard that the product of the common school today is actually inferior to that of a generation ago. The government's conception of popular education, so far as the majority of the common schools is concerned, seems to be little more than to raise the pupils a few degrees above illiteracy. Business and professional men are constantly complaining of the meagre attainments of the average graduate of the Nova Scotia School who seeks employment with them. Even the subjects, for which the schools were noted thirty or forty years ago, is no longer visible. The proximate causes of these lamentable conditions are manifold. The primary cause is administrative lethargy and neglect. A movement in the direction of educational reform that

will revitalize the work of the common school and make it be a means of efficient preparation for life's battles—is the outstanding need of the hour. That such a reform is not possible from the present administration and that its need is not even recognized by the Murray Daniels government, is abundantly proved by the thirty-four years of Mr. Murray and his political associates in office.

The Fruits of Incapacity

The Murray Daniels government's policy of drift in regard to education has produced the following results:

- 1—Closed schools in scores of districts where there are children of school age whose education is a public duty of vital importance to the Province.
- 2—The practical relegation of rural school work to "D" teachers, for whom proper standards of education are not provided, and many of whom hold merely "permissive" licenses.
- 3—The consequent inferior character of education provided by the government in the common schools.
- 4—Rapid disappearance of male teachers from the ranks of the profession.
- 5—Overloading of the common school course to the prejudice of essential subjects of instruction.
- 6—Injustice to the rural sections in the allotment of the government grant.
- 7—No fixed standard of attainments for teachers of any class.
- 8—Absolute failure to correlate the different elements of the educational system of the Province and to adapt them to the needs of the teaching profession.

The Closed Schools.

It is the duty of the Government to see that competent public instruction is brought within reach of every child of school age in the province. Closed schools in sections where there are pupils requiring instruction represent an intolerable condition, for which there is no justification, and which is utterly discreditable to the Province. That there are scores of closed schools today in sections where children are growing up without educational advantages is not due to lack of funds, but to inexcusable neglect on the part of the government in the discharge of one of the most serious public obligations resting on it.

Tribute to Kitchener at Picture House in New York.

New York, June 7—A silent but intensely impressive tribute to the memory of Lord Kitchener was paid by a large and representative audience at a theatre in West Forty-Fifth St. last night. The tribute was spontaneous, and was not anticipated by anyone in the audience.

A film entitled "How Britain Prepared" was being exhibited as an object lesson in preparedness. The first part of the picture dealt with the process evolved by Kitchener for the transformation of 5,000,000 recruits into an efficient and well-organized force of fighting men in the brief time of eighteen months.

Suddenly an excellent portrait of the dead Field Marshall was flashed upon the screen. The orchestra leader tapped his baton, and as the opening bars of the hymn "Nearer, My God, to Thee," were heard the entire audience rose and stood in silence until the strains had died away. Not a sound of applause was heard, but a man who was in the audience said afterwards that the genuineness of the tribute was more marked by the very silence in which it was paid.

Synopsis of Canadian Land Requirements

THE sole head of male over 18 years stand a quarter section Dominion land in Maritime or Alberta. Application in person at the Dominion or sub-Agency for the district may be made at Lands Agency (but not in certain conditions).

Duties—Six months residence of the land in years. A homesteader nine miles of his homestead at least 80 acres, on condition. A habitable house is required residence is performed in. In certain districts a good standing may be secured alongside his but \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence of three years after each patent; also 50 acres of Pre-emption patent may even as homesteaded conditions.

Asstler who has exhausted right may take a patent in certain districts. Duties—Must reside out of three years, cultivate a house worth \$300. The art of cultivation reduction in case of rocky land. Live stock tending for cultivation until duties.
