

The show of fruit was very small for this locality. Fruit growers show great apathy in this matter. There was nothing to prevent a magnificent display of every variety of fruit. There are plenty of apples, pears and plums, but the entries in these were very few. It was too early for grapes, but there were some fine exhibits. The best show in the fruit department was in peaches, notwithstanding the wholesale destruction of the trees in the winter of 1898. In this fruit show was very good. Of melons of every variety there was a magnificent show. Some watermelons weighed as much as fifty-nine pounds and few less than twenty-five. However, if the fruit show was poor that of the flowers and plants made up for it in excellence, beauty and number of entries. Almost every house plant and flower were represented. There was a very large and fine collection of palms as well as ferns. The cut flowers were fine and arranged in a most attractive manner.

The attendance Wednesday evening was not very large but on the following day was very good. Free admission was given to all the schools in town and adjoining country which brought in a large number of parents and children. The business men also closed during the afternoon of Thursday so that all tended to make it a success financially. The exhibition was held in the building was lighted up by the Leamington Acetylene Gas Co., who furnished a beautiful light. John Burns made a very large and

fine exhibit though not for prizes. In the evening of Thursday a concert was held in the town hall which was well patronized and which was very successful. This is the first exhibition of the society and they expect to very much improve upon it in future years.
