HE COWED THE LION.

SHIP ADVENTURES

Ran Ashore—Twice Arrested—All the Officers Die.

London, Sept. 9.—The annals of the sea would hardly furnish a parallel for the adventures of the German bark Planet, which has just been liberated from the bonds of the law at Queenstown.

The Planet was chartered by MM. Knecht & Co. of Paris, to carry a cargo of logwood from Mazatlan, Mexico, to Plymouth, where the captain would receive further orders.

While being loaded the vessel was blown ashore by a hurricane, in consequence of which the cargo had to be discharged and restowed.

Then the Planet started on her passage, but ill-luck pursued her all the way. Shortly after leaving the port, the captain, officers and crew were stricken down. The London-bound steamer Point bore in sight in May, when 210 boats from the Irish coast, and the master sent his third officer, Mr. Bryant, on board to navigate the ship to Queenstown.

Mr. Bryant found the captain very ill, and he died shortly afterwards. The first mate had died a few days before, and the second mate was dying. Signals were made to a passing steamer to take the man out of the ship, but the request was refused, and this officer also died.

The Planet eventually reached Queenstown, where fresh trouble arose. A new captain arrived and despatched orders from different agents to take the bark to Liverpool and Havre respectively. Goum & Co., Liverpool, and Odener & Co., France, set up rival times to the cargo, and the ship had to be detained at Queenstown for a settlement.

The French firm had a French judgment that it was entitled to the cargo, while Goum & Co. had the Planet arrested on a warrant of the Irish superior courts. Later on the Planet was further arrested at the suit of the owners of the steamer Crown Point and Mr. Bryant for salvage services. Bail of £1,800 was given in the case, and so far as the owners of the Crown Point were concerned the vessel was released.

Many motions and cross-motions followed in the superior courts, and at last the French firm agreed to pay the Liverpool firm £1,850 for the cargo, and to be responsible for all claims by the ship.

After three months' detention at Queenstown the Planet was therefore allowed to depart yesterday for Havre.

NO SUNDAY NEWSPAPERS.

Brussels, Sept. 10.—The Belgian Government is drawing up a bill providing for the total suppression of Sunday newspapers.

ESCAPED FROM THE CAPITAL.

Constantinople, Sept. 10.—Vice-Admiral Faik Pasha, chief of the general staff of the admiralty has made his escape from Constantinople, going by British steamer Malta. Fear of the consequences of his memorial to the Sultan denouncing the maladministration in the navy caused his flight. His property has been declared forfeited.

EUROPE'S PEACE.

Copenhagen, Sept. 10.—The Czar and Czarina and their children, the King and Queen of England, the King of Denmark, the King of Greece and 28 royal princes and princesses, all on one train, arrived here at noon to-day from Fredensborg, and were present at a farewell luncheon on board the Russian imperial yacht Standard. Then all the party, with the exception of the Czar, went on board the imperial yacht Pole Star to take leave of the Czarina. The Standard soon afterwards weighed anchor and started for Dantz, the Danish forts and all the men of war in the harbor saluting.

IN FAVOR OF REVOLUTION.

London, Sept. 10.—A special despatch from Paris says: At Montecau les Bains, some hundreds of reservists, returning in uniform to-day from the army manoeuvres, entered the town singing the "Internationale" and other revolutionary songs. A force of gendarmes attempted to disperse the reservists, but the latter fixed bayonets and charged on the police with cheers for anarchy and a social revolution. The gendarmes were scattered. The soldiers then held a mass meeting, and passed a resolution in favor of a revolution.
