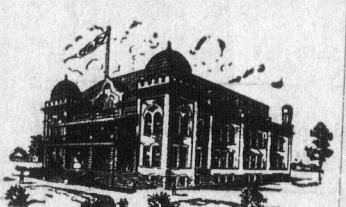

STATIONARY ENGINEERS.

Fifty Are in Attendance at the Annual Meeting at Galt.

Galt, Aug. 8.—Mayor Thomson welcomed the members of the Canadian Stationary Engineers' Association yesterday. Fifty are in attendance at the 17th annual meeting.

President Sweet's annual address spoke of legislation to compel the holding of licenses, passed at the last session of the Ontario Legislature, and said the Dominion Parliament was now looking to for a similar act.

The treasury has a balance of \$178. The secretary reported a gratifying increase in the number of subordinate lodges of the union. The members were treated to a trolley ride and dined at the Del Monte.

STRIKE OFF IN CAPITAL

Factories Resume Work in the City of St. Petersburg.

Workman's Council Decides to Call Off General Strike—Provincial Workmen Will Likely Follow Suit—Government Much Elated—Had Made Preparations for the Worst, and Rejoice at Easy Victory.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 8.—The Workmen's Council has decided to call off the strike in St. Petersburg. The announcement will be issued to-day. This action does not apply to the provinces, but there is little doubt that the workmen there will follow St. Petersburg's example.

Many Factories In Operation.

More than half of the factories here resumed work yesterday, and while the employees of some of the establishments at Moscow are still out, none of the predictions of the strike organizers are fulfilled. Many of the trades unions refused to join in the movement. The railroad men, whose co-operation was vital, could not be induced to give the signal for a strike, and there was no sign of a serious peasant movement.

Time Badly Chosen.

While the repressions and arrests of the leaders undoubtedly were a great factor in bringing about the present situation, it is apparent that the time was ill chosen for a strike. The people were not in the temper to support it. As a consequence the revolutionary leaders, who inspired it, with the intention of transferring the movement into an armed uprising, have suffered a severe loss of prestige.

The Government Rejoices.

The Government, which had prepared for the worst, holding military trains in readiness at all the centres, and had even made arrangements to send out the foreign mails by torpedo boats from St. Petersburg, naturally is greatly rejoiced at its victory. The leaders of the non-revolutionary parties do not conceal their satisfaction at the defeat of their old allies of the Extreme Left, as they feared that a great strike, with widespread disorders entailing repression, might be used as justification by the Government to suspend the elections and the assembling of a new Parliament. With comparative tranquillity ahead they can hold the Government to its promises.

A Revolutionary Manifesto.

The former Deputy composing the Social Democratic and Labor parties, Polish and Jewish committees, and various revolutionary bodies, have issued a joint manifesto, which, after reciting the events of the past few weeks, says:

"The army and the navy have raised the standard of insurrection against the oppressors of the people. The roar of guns at Sveaborg and Cronstadt has given the signal for a new Russian Revolution."

"The people see now they can hope and expect nothing so long as the State power is in the hands of its enemies. Universal, equal, direct, and secret suffrage. The people must apply themselves. Citizens all, to whom freedom is dear, we call upon you for a decisive struggle against the Government of the Emperor, for a national Government and for land and liberty."

"Long live the general strike and the decisive struggle for national power."

Russians Shell Bandits.

Harbin, Manchuria, Aug. 8.—A band of Chinese bandits, engaged in pillaging along the Sungari River, was killed by a Russian gunboat Monday. A large number of the bandits were killed.

THE BRITISH PRAY.

While Emigrants From the Continent Celebrate in Drunken Orgy.

London, Aug. 8.—(C. A. P.)—The Globe, referring to the emigrants to Canada, says that the Continental emigrant celebrates his departure by an orgy with friends, while the Britisher leaves for a native land to the accompaniment of prayer.

Site For Normal School.

Peterboro, Aug. 8.—Dr. Seath, superintendent of education, and Dr. Colquhoun, deputy minister, visited the city yesterday and, in company with Mayor Best and representatives of the City Council and Board of Education, visited about a dozen eligible sites for the proposed new normal school. No selection was made. The visitors will report to the Council.

Conductor Is Blamed.

London, Aug. 8.—The responsibility for the accident at St. Thomas Saturday morning has been placed by the authorities of the Pere Marquette upon Conductor Drake of the Pere Marquette train. Drake insisted that he had given his engineer orders to proceed, after he had looked at the register, and saw that three trains had reported.

Baron Komura In Montreal.

Montreal, Aug. 8.—Baron Komura, Japanese ambassador to the Court of James, reached here yesterday and is the guest of Sir William Van Horne. The party will leave this afternoon for Quebec and will sail on Thursday on the Empress of Ireland.

Bad News From Oshani.

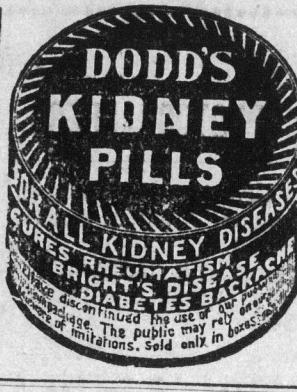
Toronto, Aug. 8.—Word has been received by the Department of Crown Lands that a serious fire has broken out in the Gilles Timber Limit. A telegram from Fire-ranger J. F. McDougall states that the blaze is partially under control.

Joe Men Indicted.

Philadelphia, Aug. 8.—The grand jury yesterday found true bills of indictment against fourteen members of the Philadelphia Joe Exchange, who are charged with conspiracy to increase the price of Joe.

Pitched Battle With Tartars.

Tiflis, Aug. 8.—Tartars fought a pitched battle with Russian troops Monday night. The combat lasted until Tuesday afternoon. Tartars were 2,000 strong, and occupied favorable positions.



Toronto Carpenters Strike.

Toronto, Aug. 8.—At a mass meeting of the city carpenters at Victoria Hall last night, it was unanimously decided to strike. The men will quit work at 5 o'clock to-day. They want an agreement with the Builders' Exchange. Close upon \$8,000,000 worth of building permits have been issued here this year, and the strike means a nasty mess unless a settlement is soon reached.

Will Carry the Mails.

Montreal, Aug. 8.—An agreement has arrived at between the Dominion Government and the Dominion Line, whereby mail will be carried by the Canada and Great Britain by the vessels of this company. The first vessel to proceed with the mails from Canada will be the Ottawa, sailing from Montreal on Saturday morning next.

New Haven, Conn., Aug. 8.—Alleging that several of their number have been discharged without just cause by the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, about 200 switchmen in the freight yards here, and in Cedar Hill, went out on strike yesterday, and, as a consequence, there is more or less of a tie-up in the freight business of the city.

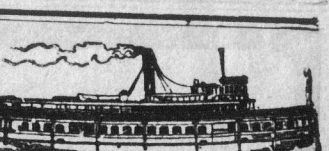

TO TOUR THE COLONIES.

British Labor Leader to Establish Harmony With Canadian Brethren.
London, Aug. 8.—(C. A. P.)—Commenced a tour of the Colonies, J. B. MacDonald, whip of the Labor party, leaves for Canada to-day. The object of his trip is to establish harmony and co-operation between the Labor party here and in the colonies.
In Canada he will confer with trade unionists of Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, and he hopes to discuss matters with Sir Wilfrid Laurier and other public men to whom he has letters of introduction. He leaves Vancouver Sept. 14 for Australia and New Zealand.

Rainmaker Fail in Klondike.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 8.—Hastfield, so called rainmaker of Los Angeles, Cal., has returned by the Princess Beatrice from Dawson, where he had been retained to supply sufficient water from the clouds to accommodate the hydraulic interests of the upper Yukon. If successful he was to receive a bonus of \$10,000 from the mine owners and the territorial Government. He failed, but the Government paid all expenses of himself and his brother from the time they left Los Angeles until they returned.
