WILL BUILD HOTEL

Frank Babcock, Formerly Of The
City Will Erect An Up-To-Date
House In London

A message to the effect that Beth-
une, Bethune and Fuch, architects,
Buffalo, will build the new hotel in
London when location is decided,
which will be yesterday from Mr.
Babcock, who announced a short
time ago, while in Toronto, that
before long he would have a com-
pany organized which would build a
large and up-to-date hotel in Lon-
don.

Evidently Mr. Babcock has suc-
ceeded in demonstrating that the
proposition is a good one, and has
had sufficient capital subscribed to
put the proposition through.

It is further announced that the
architects mentioned are members
of the same firm which built the
New Lafayette Hotel, which is
known as one of the most modern
hotels in Buffalo of any of the
other large cities.

Mr. Babcock promises before long
to be able to announce definitely
and authoritatively when the new
hotel will be commenced, and where.

Mr. Babcock is an old Chatham
boy and will be remembered by the
many local lovers of Canada's na-
tional game.

BIG BOILER EXPLODES

Merrill, Oct. 30.—One of the large
boilers in the C. H. Campbell farm
belonging to Charlie Gore, drilling
contractor, exploded on Saturday,
and was blown about fifty feet in
the air, striking on its flue and only
about four or five feet from its
original position. The workers on
the drilling rig at the time were
just hitching in to the tools, which
took them away from the offending
boiler, and possibly saved loss of life.
The boiler is almost a complete
wreck. Low water is supposed to
have been the cause of the explosion.

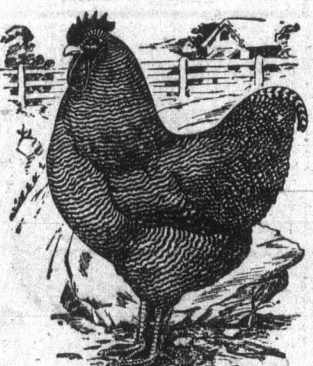

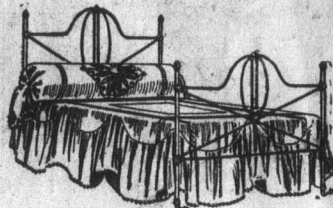
