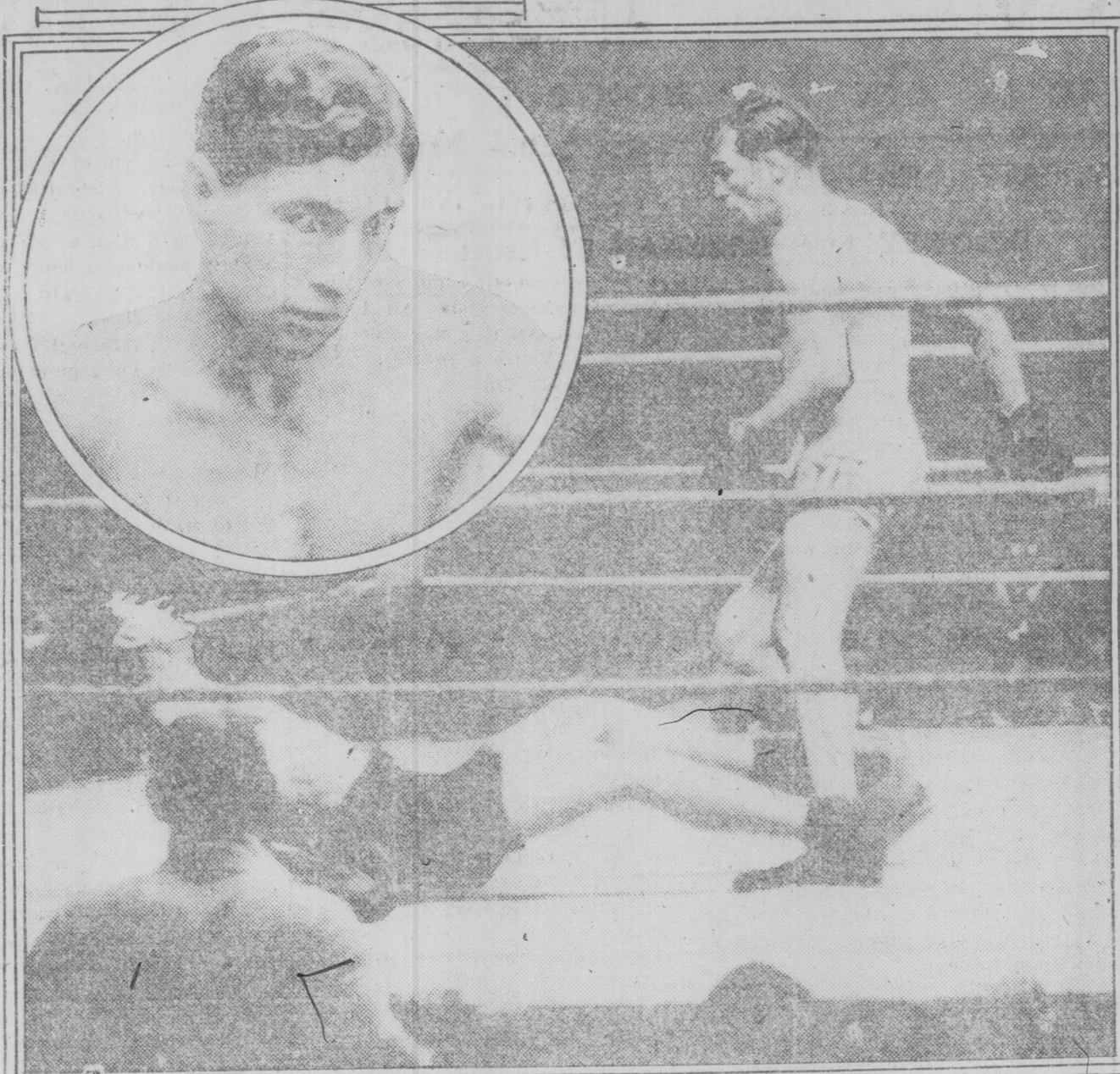

**BATTLE BETWEEN TED LEWIS AND JOHNNY BASHAM IN ENGLAND.**



Ted Kid Lewis, who for the second time recently knocked out Johnny Basham, the British welterweight champion, will, according to his manager, Charles J. Harvey, meet Jack Britton for the world's title in a bout at Royal Albert Hall, London, England, next February. Britton won the world's welterweight championship by knocking out Lewis in the ninth round at Canton, Ohio, March 17, 1919. In the accompanying photograph Lewis is shown knocking out Basham in the nineteenth round of their last engagement. Britton, Lewis' next opponent, appears in the circle.

**Gunmen Stampede 200 in Saloon**

\$15,000 in Cash Secured by Bandits—Other Robberies.

(New York Times) Five daylight robberies yesterday in this city and vicinity by bands numbering more than twenty men caused a loss of more than \$100,000 among about thirty victims.

Two hundred men in a cafe at Boulevard Avenue and Fifty-first street, Bayonne, stampeded last night when eight armed men, believed to be members of a band that has been robbing New Jersey saloons, were trying to hold them in such terror that their money and watches could be taken. Before the panic ended the robbers had taken more than \$15,000 in cash and watches from the men, and a score of shots had been fired.

Leading the way into the place, the chief of the bandits appeared to be surprised when he saw such a large crowd, but before he could turn he was pushed into the room by his seven armed companions, all of whom were masked. The order was given to the crowd to line up, with hands in air, with the warning that "the first man who moved an eyelash would be shot."

While the bandits were emptying the pockets of their victims into small bags, several shoes were fired through the window, and the stampede began. One man at the end of the line leaped through a glass window to the sidewalk, and despite promiscuous firing by the bandits, all of the men rushed for the doors and windows. Every window in the place was smashed in the panic, and some of the victims were hurt by glass and bruised in the rush to escape.

**ONE HOLD-UP MAN CAUGHT.**

One man was captured after a gang had robbed Henry Davidoff, a jeweler, of 1,744 Madison Avenue, yesterday afternoon, of about \$5,000 in watches and diamonds. A civilian passing in an automobile saw four hold-up men run out of the store and start away in a taxicab. He pursued them until he found policemen and caused the arrest of one of the men and the chauffeur of the taxicab.

The jeweler said the men asked to see watches and leaped upon him as he went for a tray. Two rushed him into a rear room while the others started to load up with watches and diamonds.

The civilian who saw the robbery pursued the taxicab west to Fifth Avenue, thence to 19th Street, and down Central Park West. At 106th Street and Amsterdam Avenue he picked up two tariff policemen and then overhauled the fleeing car. Charles Gallinski of 4,838 Third Avenue, was arrested on the charge of acting in concert in the robbery, and Edward Marks of 111 East 116th Street, who had about \$1,500 worth of watches and jewels in his possession, the police said, was arrested on the charge of robbery.



In a similar robbery, three men held up clerks in the drug store of Abraham Weinstein, at 1,576 St. Nicholas Avenue, and escaped with about \$50 from the cash register.

**BULLETS FLY OVER SCHOOL CHILDREN.**

Bullets flew over the heads of school children on their way home to lunch yesterday when clerks were pursuing four men who had robbed a Sheffield Forms store at 2,836 Eight Avenue. The bandits escaped with about \$2,000 in cash.

The men entered the store with a request for butter-milk. John McGinnis, a collector, had taken the money from the chief clerk and was about to leave. The robbers saw the money pass, and all drew pistols and threatened to kill the employees, who were forced to stand with their faces to the wall.

One man remained in the store guarding the two men while the others ran to the automobile through a group of school children who had been attracted by the excitement. The automobile faced up Eight Avenue and turned into 152nd Street, while the clerks were trying to get the motor-man of a street car to give chase. It was reported that the automobile hurried to the Bronx before the police were notified. Police of the West 152nd Street Station, which is only a few blocks away, said they thought the automobile fitted the description of a car reported stolen several days ago.

Patrolman Michael Falvey of the East Thirty-fifth Street Station prevented three hold-up men from finishing their job in a saloon at 323 Second Avenue yesterday. The patrolman arrived as three armed men were lining up the proprietor and his customers. Falvey and the men opened fire, and the patrolman thinks he wounded one of the robbers. He arrested Angelo Malley, of Bridgeport, Conn. About \$275 was stolen before the policemen arrived.

**Grain Storage**

Increase By Over Million And A Half Bushels In Week.

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—Grain in store at the different public elevators through out Canada on Dec. 3 for the week ending Dec. 3 increased by 1,559,348 bushels, as compared with the previous week. The increase in the amount of wheat in store was 409,471 bushels. In western country elevators there was a slight decrease in the wheat in store, while at terminal elevators at Fort William and Port Arthur the decrease was 194,000 bushels. In the public elevators in the east, however, the quality of grain in store increased by 2,687,780 bushels in wheat, oats, barley and flax.

**SPORT AND BUSINESS**

Sport some times has a good effect on business. As a direct consequence of the recent International Fishermen's race more than one fishing vessel will be built in Nova Scotia this winter. In view of the fact that prior to the race few if any shipyards in Nova Scotia had contracts for the construction of fishing vessels during the winter months various interests in the Maritime Provinces have some reason to regard the Fishermen's race—called by the New York Tribune the "supreme sporting event of 1920" as a good business proposition as well.

To stage the race public spirited men of Nova Scotia put up a matter of \$10,000 and a certain amount of time, which though sometimes referred to as money is not legal tender. In addition the Halifax Herald and Mail put up a cup, but if those enterprising journals have any use for advertising they have probably labelled their expenditure on the cup for the Blue Ribbon of the fishing fleets as a good investment. As a result of these expenditures one company has been formed to build a vessel, which will be ready for the fishing in the spring, and which it is hoped will show sufficient speed to secure the honor of challenging for the cup next year.
