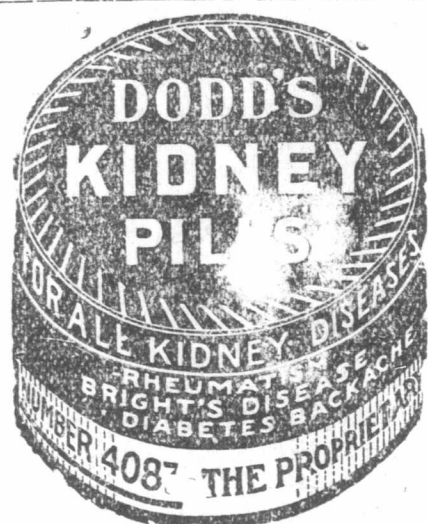
## ELLISTON L.O.A. AND ITS 50TH ANNIVERSARY

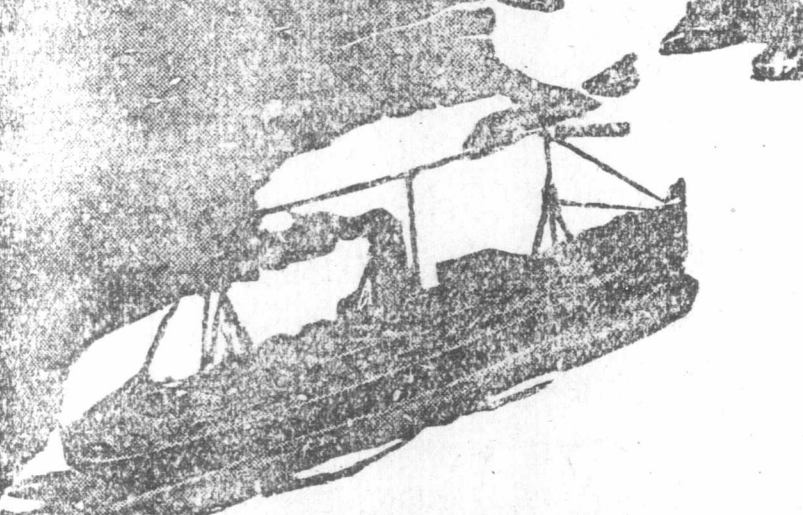

## More Coal From Happier Workers

Record Productions In Nova Scotia—Big Orders Placed.

NEW GLASGOW, N.S., April 17.—Alex. MacNeil, of Glace Bay, general superintendent of colliers for the British Empire Steel Corporation, is spending a few days in Pictou County, inspecting local coal mines. He advises that the mines in both Cape Breton and Pictou County are reaching a much higher state of efficiency than for years, with record outputs.

Work at the collieries at present is only at the rate of about three days a week, but Mr. MacNeil looks for much better employment conditions with the opening of navigation. He attributes the better efficiency to more satisfactory relations between management and men.

## COAL AND STEEL

SYDNEY, N.S., April. — Over 100,000 tons of coal have been contracted for in Newfoundland for delivery this summer from the Dominion Coal Company, A. W. McMaster, district sales manager, told a correspondent today on arrival from the ancient colony.

The company has sold to the Government between 50,000 and 60,000 tons which will be used by its various boats, railways and other services. A similar amount has been sold to local dealers at St. John for domestic purposes.

The New Zealand Shipping Company's steamer Tremadown sailed from Louisbourg lately with 1,000 tons of steel products for South Africa. She called at St. John, N.B., for the remainder of her cargo.

## Sentence of Death By Default

CARRIES LOSS OF NATIONALITY.

PARIS, April 18.—Does a man condemned to death by default lose his nationality? The Judge of the First Civil Tribunal of Paris has decided that he does. If a condemned person were in the country he would be executed, and consequently he would not be in the country.

This novel decision is called into being by a plea of Rechad Halin Bey, a former Turkish Minister, and sign of the Treaty of Sevres, that, inasmuch as his conjugal domicile is Constantinople, the French courts

are incompetent to hear his wife's suit for divorce. Rechad Halin Bey's downfall, it will be remembered, followed the victory of the Kemalists, and he was forced to flee the country. The Ankara Government then condemned him to death by default, and to save his head he has resided in Paris. Recently Mme. Rechad Halin, who is a French woman, became dissatisfied with her domestic situation, and demanded a divorce.

Rechad Halin Bey opposed her application, and contested the court's jurisdiction, with the result that his nationality is considered dead, even though he is alive and kicking against desertion by his wife.

"The U. M. W. of A. wishes to help the mine workers of Nova Scotia, and will continue to render all assistance possible and to co-operate with those in charge of affairs in Nova Scotia in promoting the best interests of the mine workers and their families."
