The Pullman Boycott.

Dan Moloney, June 29.—J. E. Stevens, Master Workman of the Knights of Labor, returned to DeMoines yesterday. He predicts the strike against the Pullman will be the biggest one in the history of the country. He said the Knights would fight it to the bitter end.

Tacoma, Wash., June 29.—The strike on the Northern Pacific Railroad has extended to the coast, and all trains are tied up. The State militia en route to the summer encampment are stranded. United States Judge Hanford has issued orders to the receivers to get the troops through to Tacoma, a distance of hundred miles.

Threatening the Guards.

Toronto, June 29.—Dr. Bryce has returned from his conference with the local health officers of Essex, Lambton and Kent Counties, and reports the taking of satisfactory steps to avert the entry of smallpox into the Province. These are needed, for there are at present 29 cases in Detroit, 21 of the cases being children and a number of them having been born here. The houses are being guarded by policemen, two at each. The accommoda-

tion is very imperfect, two temporary pest houses being in use, and a third being in preparation. At the meeting, which was held on Thursday, 25 representatives of local health boards were present, and gave a statement of what had been done. The Provincial Inspectorate inspectors will watch the frontiers for suspected cases, two at Windsor, and one at Sarnia, and the local officers are watching strangers who come across the river. The report showed that compulsory vaccination has been tried in fifteen out of eighteen municipalities in Essex, in six in Kent, and in one or two in Lambton. The conference unanimously adopted a resolution urging the adoption of compulsory vaccination, and calling upon the Provincial Board of Health to demand the immediate appointment of local officers in all municipalities which have neglected to make such preparations.

2000 for Being Called a Methodist.

Montreal, June 29.—An interesting judgment was rendered today by Judge Scott in the action for \$200 damages brought by Mr. Max Sauvile, a well-known journalist, against Mr. Tardivel, proprietor of *The Verité de Québec*, for calling him a Methodist. The court held that the writer of Mr. Sauvile had sometimes written, but he always asserted that he was a Roman Catholic, a disaffected Catholic evidently, but one constantly referring to the Roman Catholic Church as "our religion." There was nothing in all his writings that could afford a basis for the claim that he was not a Catholic. A man cannot be said to be a Roman Catholic if he himself declares that he is not, and that there is no proof to the contrary. Whether Mr. Sauvile was a good or bad Catholic, it was not for the court to decide, no more than for Mr. Tardivel; but it is between that and calling him a Methodist that there was all the difference in the world. In the eyes of the majority of the population, it is easier to call a man a "Methodist" than to call him a "Roman Catholic," especially in view of the fact that the Roman Catholic Church is the largest in the world.

In the course of his argumentation, Mr. Tardivel must be held to be an insult, and it was not justified. On the whole, proof being made that the plaintiff is a Methodist, and that the contrary application of the term "Methodist" caused damage to the full extent of \$200, it claimed judgment must go in his favor for that amount, with costs.
