Aroostook Potato Crop Much Below That of The Last Year.

Judging from estimates made by 100 potato growers of Aroostook county, the potato crop in Maine's greatest potato producing section will be at least 25 per cent below last season's mark. This information is from F. E. Embree, of Riverhead, N. Y., who with his father, C. E. Embree, the general manager of the Farmer's Union of Maine has been making a trip to Aroostook county.

"I have just returned from Aroostook county," Mr. Embree told a Commercial man, Tuesday, "and I found that there has been a slight increase in the potato acreage in that section. In talking over the situation with 100 potato growers, I found that those 100 men showed an increase in acreage over last year of 139 acres. They also estimated that through the excessive wet weather they had lost completely an acre a piece of potatoes, which left a small percentage of increase.

"The decrease in yield for this season due to weather conditions they placed at 25 per cent, and it was the opinion of all of them that there would be about a 75 per cent crop there this year.

"Such potatoes as they will get promise to be exceptionally good.

"Shipments from Aroostook county will not come freely until about the middle of September, but there is some talk of a car being sent out of Presque Isle the last of this week or the first of next. It certainly will be immature stock. The market conditions at the consuming end have a tendency just now to cause buyers to get things moving as soon as they can, both Boston and New York markets being particularly good just at present.

"Along the Maine Central points I figure that there will be 30 or 40 per cent increase in acreage over last year. The fields in central Maine are looking exceedingly well and the indication is that the yield will be a good one.

"Notwithstanding the increased acreage along the Maine Central the crop there will not be up to 1910, when 5,300,000 bushels of potatoes were shipped from Maine Central points. In 1911 there were only 2,700,000 bushels. The increased acreage will not make up the difference between the two years."

Enjoyable Event at Gordonsville.

A large number of people of Gordonsville met on Thursday at the home of David White to pay their respects to his mother, Mrs. Margaret Jane White, by giving her a picnic on her eighty-fourth birthday.

This was not the ordinary picnic of swings, music and baseball games, such as the young people enjoy, but a good table spread in the orchard under the old apple trees, bounteously supplied with everything good including ice cream and an opportunity for a pleasant social talk on the good old days that had passed, a thing which old folks enjoy.

All the old pioneers were present, five of them not less than eighty years of age. All the great trees in the forest had fallen except these five.

Fifty years ago, when Mrs. White and her husband and family, and her sister's family came up the river in a tow boat they landed on what was then called Schicketchawik. At the time the moral condition of their part of the country was at a pretty low ebb. Each of the settlers had made a small clearing, built some rough buildings, and their amusements were of a very primitive order. If a man wanted to command respect he did it by beating some other man. The "frolics" of those days were very strenuous, and the run was very powerful.

Things were in that state when the Whites came to Gordonsville. They did much to raise the standard of the community, and they long enjoyed the whole country side.

General Egg Farming.

Some hints by Joel M. Foster, founder of the famous Ranocas Poultry Farm, New Jersey, which annually produces more than a million eggs. Egg farming is the most profitable branch of poultry growing. There are four sources of profit from the eggs: marketing eggs all the year; selected hatching eggs that bring still higher prices; baby chicks; and an unusual occurrence of fancy fowls.

The value of the eggs annually produced is many millions of dollars more than the value of poultry meat

produced. About 1,000,000,000 eggs are consumed in New York annually, but so few of them are of premium quality that the people who will have fresh eggs must pay five to twenty cents per dozen premium. There is no chance of a low-price era of high-class eggs. The rapid growth of the country's population keeps the demand for eggs far in excess of the supply.

The man raising broilers or roasters gets no profit other than the meat profit. The egg farmer can get a share of the meat profit finally, but first he sells 400 to 500 eggs from each hen. Keeping hens after they have reached the pullet size requires only the comparatively small investment for laying houses; and each hen will pay a profit of \$2.78 a year over the cost of feeding. This is many times more than could be made from chickens at the broiler age.

In farming for eggs the hatching can be done in the natural breeding season, when conditions are most favorable. The grower of poultry meat has to hatch eggs and care for young chicks the year round—when Nature is with him and when Nature is against him. If the breeding hen is moulting, or for any other reason is low in vitality, the chicks from her eggs will be weak. Out of season not more than fifty percent of the eggs are likely to be fertile.

In egg farming there is a great economy in feeding, if as at the Ranocas farm, White Leghorn fowls are used. It costs less to bring to adult size and maintain a small hen than to provide for a large one. The Ranocas White Leghorn hen weighs about four pounds at maturity and produces eggs as large as any breed. The size, shape and color of the eggs are decided by Nature, regardless of the size and color of the hen.

Besides market eggs to sell at fancy prices, the general egg farmer with a noted strain of birds, has unlimited opportunities to dispose of hatching eggs and day-old chicks in season. These can be produced cheaply and sold at high prices.

There is no department of poultry culture that offers better chances of money making and fewer chances of failure than general egg farming. Failures in it are due to similar causes as in other departments of the business, but the opportunities for success are more numerous. Intelligent care and proper equipment are necessary to a successful chicken business. Birds are intensely nervous by nature and easily affected for good or ill.

If good strains of birds are lacking, if equipment is inadequate, if intelligence is absent, if management is slack, the chicken business, like any other business will go to wreck.


