Armstrong, one of the oldest and most highly respected residents of Middle Perth, passed away at his home at an early hour on Friday morning as the result of a paralytic stroke which he had suffered in the early fall, and from which he had never recovered. He had been in poor health for a number of years, therefore his death was not unexpected. His age was 68 years. He was one of the ten children of the late Stillman and Maria Armstrong, seven of whom are living, namely, Franklin Armstrong of Fort Fairfield, Albert formerly of this place but now of Lowell, Mrs. Fulton of Lowell, Mrs. Elizabeth DeMerchant, Tobiasse Narrows, Mrs. Bradford Lovely of this place, Mrs. C. H. McLaughlin and Mrs. E. W. Cox of Kilburn. An older brother, Wilbert Armstrong of Fort Fairfield, died about three years ago and a sister, Mrs. James Stewart, about 25 years ago. The deceased leaves besides his widow, who was formerly Miss Crockett, five sons: The oldest, Judson Armstrong of Vancouver, David and F. I. Armstrong of Cochrane, Ont., Stillman of Vancouver and George of this town, and one daughter, Mrs. W. Garvey at home, besides a number of grandchildren and other relatives. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon from his late home to the U. B. church and was very largely attended. Rev. Mr. Koch officiated. Appropriate music was rendered by Mrs. Nellie Anderson, Mrs. M. L. Wright, Mrs. A. G. Ganter, Miss Dorothy Olmstead, C. L. Olmstead,

M. H. Craig, H. Smith and Mr. Wright, with Mrs. George McLaughlin as organist. C. E. DeMerchant, H. P. William Kerr Has New Appointment

The following article from The Telegraph concerns a former Hartland man, well known all over the two counties:

The duties of the office of provincial superintendent of immigration will be carried out by William Kerr until the first of next month, when Fred E. Sharpe, who has been appointed to that position will take office. Meanwhile Mr. Kerr is looking after such matters connected with the Soldiers' Settlement Board as will not wait until the board's office is opened.

Mr. Kerr resigned from the office of superintendent of immigration in order to accept the federal government appointment as assistant to Lieutenant Robertson, maritime provinces representative of the Soldiers' Settlement Board. The provincial government was requested to accept his resignation by Lieutenant Robertson, who was anxious to secure his services and Mr. Kerr desired to take up this work, for which his previous experience has fitted him, and he was released and Mr. Sharp appointed in his place.

Widow of Joseph McGee Dead.

On Wednesday, of last week there died at Union Hospital, Fort Fairfield, Mrs. Maria Elizabeth McGee, widow of Joseph McGee, Esq., a life-long resident of Somerville. After her husband's death, which occurred about nine years ago, Mrs. McGee went to Fort Fairfield and lived with her daughter, Mrs. Frank T. Kimball. Until recently she enjoyed fair health. A few weeks ago she suffered a fall and fractured a hip, and she never recovered from the shock. Deceased children are D'Arcy, Adelaide, Mont, Max, George and Charles. Mrs. McGee is very well remembered here and was highly respected. She was a good mother and a woman of clever mind. She was born in Hodgden, Me., 77 years ago. Her remains will be brought to Hartland for interment when spring opens.

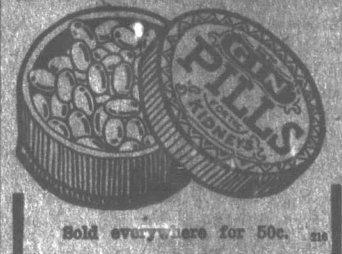

The town of Hartland, which was allotted \$150, had last evening subscribed and paid well over \$200.

WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

The Woman's Institute met in the Armory on Monday evening after a lapse of two months owing to the influenza epidemic. After the usual opening exercises, several communications were read, one from the Secretary Soldiers' Comforts Association, St. John, saying that a cable had been received from Shorncliffe, England, advising that no more supplies be sent across, but money was required for special comforts for the boys who are holding the lines. It was voted that we send some financial aid; \$5. It was also voted for the Red Shield movement of the Salvation Army. The Institute by a unanimous vote placed itself on record in favour of medical inspection in public schools and as a means of co-operation, we endeavour to interest our town and County councillors in the adoption of such legislation. It was decided that our next regular meeting Feb. 17th be a "Gentlemen's evening" when the members will entertain their husbands and other gentlemen friends, including all returned soldiers in our town. The W. I. intends giving another of their pleasing entertainments in the near future.

New Brunswick Has Best Trunk Road Plans

B. M. Hill, Highway Engineer for New Brunswick, has returned from Ottawa where he was with Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, for a conference with D. W. Campbell Dominion Highway Commissioner. Mr. Hill feels greatly encouraged by the reception given by Mr. Campbell and believes that Federal assistance for improved roads is coming. The great increase in the number of motor vehicles is an important factor in the highway situation. Mr. Campbell had received delegations from the other provinces prior to the visit of Hon. Mr. Veniot and Mr. Hill. He stated that New Brunswick had the best outlined plans for trunk roads and sub-trunk roads of any of any province with the possible exception of Ontario.
