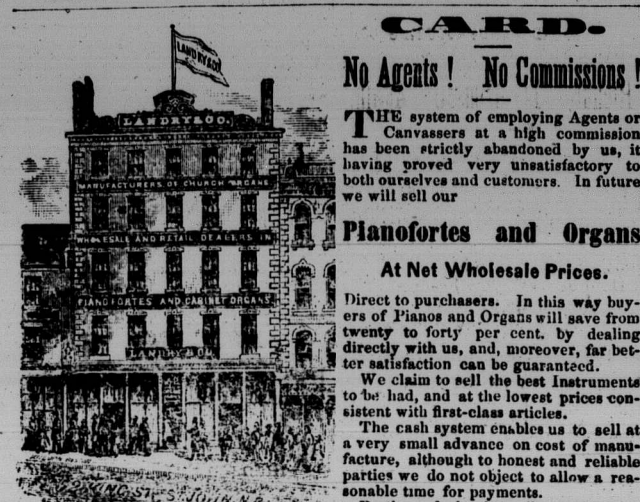


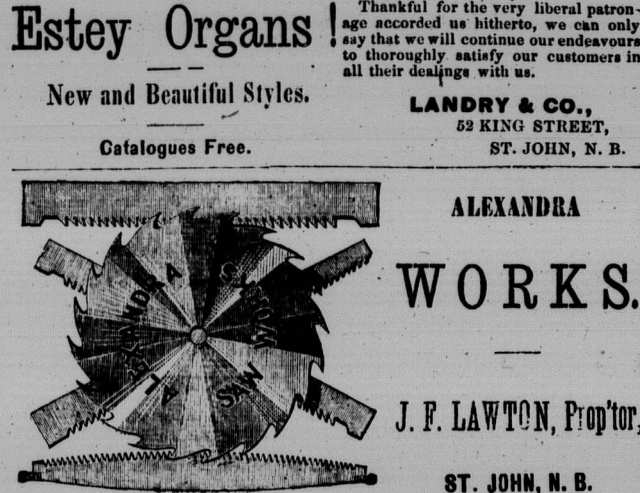

Baker, Esq., North Bedouge, sowed

**ROBERT AT AMHERST.—On Tues-
day, the safe of Jas. Z. Bliss, Esq.,
opened, and some \$200 and a
parcel of promissory notes ab-
stracted. Two women working about
the place were arrested on charge of
the theft.**

**MATILDA STANLEY, known as the
Gypsy Queen, and recognized as
such by all the tribes throughout the

15th inst. Over 25,000 people were
in attendance. The funeral procession
was a mile long.**

**ACCIDENT ON THE DORCHESTER
PENITENTIARY.—A Dorchester cor-
respondent writes:—Two men were
seriously injured on the Provincial
Penitentiary on Thursday. The
steam derrick, after having raised to
the top of the wall a load of planks
and letting it down into the build-
ing with more violence than they in-
tended, struck a stage on which two
carpenters, named McDougall and
Penny, were working, sending them
into the air some six feet, and on
falling to the bottom McDougall
fractured his back badly, breaking two
bones and injuring himself less severe
otherwise. Penny struck his head
against the wall, cutting his head
and got his thighs hurt by a plank
falling across them. This is the
first accident that has happened on
the works since the beginning.—
Moncton Times.**

A Mystery of Staten Island.

**Finding the Corpse of a Beautiful
Woman in a Barrel.**

"By Jove, that's a barrel I slipped
on!" said John Callahan, as he picked
himself up from the ground, and
looked at a smooth, clean, stave that
bulged above the surface. "What's
a barrel doing in the ground way out
here?" His three or four comrades
gathered round him and began to
kick the stave away from the other
staves. Soon they had uncovered
half the barrel. "There's something
in it," continued Callahan. "Let us
see what it is," and he tore off a piece
of Brussels carpeting that was bound
over one end and tied with a rope.
There was more carpeting within,
and pulling it partly out, a body
of a young woman was disclosed.
The boys ran to New Brighton and
told Coroner Dempsey.

John Callahan, a lad of 14, had
been sent by his father to watch his
cows that were pastured on Staten
Island back of New Brighton, not
far from Still Lake, and he had
been startled by cries and moans of "Oh,
God! Oh, God!" emanating from a
small brick house, No. 18 St. Martin
street. Entering I found on the bed
a little girl, apparently about eight
years old, yellow as gold, with lips
and hands stained with the fatal
black vomit. At her side, in the
same bed, was another child, perhaps
two years younger, with the fire
of the terrible fever slowly but surely
consuming her young life, while the
mother, half crazed with the agony
of her surroundings, almost ex-
hausted, lay upon the floor crying out
to comfort her. Leaving this scene
of death, and approaching the com-
mencement of St. Martin street (at
Beale street), a colored woman, with
bloodshot eyes, dishevelled hair and
grim, stricken appearance, asked me
if I would Massie be so good as to send
the funeral man; her two children
were dead, and her husband would
soon follow.
