THE ROYAL VISIT.

The Prince of Wales Tells Londoners of His Trip Through the Dominion.

SALISBURY AND CHAMBERLAIN SPEAK.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—During the reception at the Guildhall yesterday the Prince of Wales made a speech on the relations between the motherland and the colonies. He referred to each colony he had visited, and in speaking about the Dominion of Canada said: "To Canada was borne the message already conveyed to Australia and New Zealand of the motherland's loving appreciation of the services rendered by its gallant sons. In the journey from ocean to ocean, marvellous in its comfort and organization, we were enabled to see something of its matchless scenery, the richness of its soil and the boundless possibilities of that vast and but partly explored country. We saw, too, the success which has crowned the efforts to weld into one community the people of its two great races."

Mr. Chamberlain was accorded a tremendous reception when he rose to respond to Lord Rosebery's toast to the colonies.

Lord Salisbury said: "No doubt it is true just at this moment, that we have many enemies who are not very reticent in expressing their opinion. But, on the other hand, today's celebration, which is largely due to the action and co-operation of their royal highnesses, has shown that we possess in the support of our distant kinsmen an approval and a sanction, which to us, is worth infinitely more than all the contempt and all the censure that we may receive from other nations."

"I cannot admit that they are judges of our conduct, or that we can modify our proceedings in deference to their opinion. What we look to are the opinions of our own kinsmen who belong to our own empire. We have received from all portions of that empire an indication that we have lost nothing in the opinion they hold of the justice of our claim."

BRIGHT PROPOSITION.

Halifax Board of Trade Would Hand Intercolonial Over to the C. P. R.

HALIFAX, Dec. 6.—The Halifax board of trade this afternoon unanimously passed a resolution favoring the transfer of the management of the Intercolonial to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company; also the following: "Whereas resolved, that this board communicate with the several boards of trade throughout the Dominion and ask if they would unite in a memorial to the federal government favoring the transfer of the management of the Intercolonial Railway to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, provided such arrangements could be made with that company as would, while retaining government ownership of the road, promote local traffic and lead to the extension development of Canada in export and import business through the ports of Quebec, St. John, Halifax and Sydney."

A strong resolution was also passed urging upon the Dominion government the necessity of establishing a fast steamship service. The resolution calls for a line equal to any running out of New York.

STILL UNCERTAIN

As to the Fate of Miss Stone, the Captured Missionary.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The Rev. Dr. Rose, the Superintendent of American Missions at Salonica, replying to the World's public opinion, asking his opinion regarding the situation so far as Miss Stone is concerned, wired as follows: "I hope Miss Stone is living, though her reported death causes anxiety. However, seemingly the report did not come from eye witnesses and needs verification. Miss Stone was injured to hard-hip, of firm faith, and not one to die of grief."

Dr. Haskell also telegraphs from Salonica: "There is an apparently well founded rumor that both captives were alive and well on Nov. 24, in a secret shelter place, where they are likely to remain for weeks. Our messengers have not returned."

HELD AT BAY.

Remarkable Escape of a British Convict—Holding Off the Wardens.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—A convict at the Pentonville prison, who managed to elude the wardens, has established a sort of Fontenoy on the roof of the institution, and for the last thirty hours has defied all attempts to dislodge him. Thousands of spectators are watching the show, and aiding the prisoner by timely warnings of the movements of his would-be captors. Ladders placed against the wall are promptly thrown down by the occupant of the roof whose reckless movements and wild laughter at the futile efforts of the wardens are thought to indicate insanity. The fugitive has collected a large pile of slate which he gleefully throws at the heads of the officials who attempt to scale the wall by means of ladders. At noon he was still holding the officials at bay.

The convict eventually was starved into submission. He surrendered this afternoon, after defeating all attempts to dislodge him by force. He was finally lured to the ground by the offer of a dish of roast beef and potatoes.

LIVERPOOL FIRE.

LIVERPOOL, Dec. 6.—The fire in the Liverpool Exchange buildings, which broke out this morning as the result of an explosion, was subdued after two and a half hours' work by the firemen. The Chamber of Commerce offices and the Exchange News rooms were destroyed. The damage is considerable.

TOPEKA, Kan., Dec. 5.—Carrie Nation today announced the suspension of her paper, the "Smasher's Mail," which was started about a year ago. She says it did not pay.
