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ed against the Hamilton man until the eighth inning. Local fans were pulling towards the close of the game for Smith to establish a no-hit record, but Jimmy Bradley, the league's leading hitter, put a set calculation in, a clean single over second. In the ninth Verity got a couple of scratch hits, but their base running was off cold, and two runners were retired at the plate. Smith struck out nine men, and won his game with ease. McCaig, the Verity slow ball seppaw, was hammered for 13 runs in seven innings, when he was relieved by Halston, who was nursing a sore arm, and on that account was prevented from going in. Halston held St. Pats hitless, and from now on will be pitched regularly. McCaig having been let out by Manager Bond.
