

# MARKETS AND FINANCE

## Toronto Markets

### LIVE STOCK.

The railways report 98 car loads of live stock at the city market for Wednesday and Thursday, consisting of 1,127 cattle, 1,422 hogs, 2,223 sheep and lambs, 276 calves and 2 horses.

The quality of fat cattle was common to medium, with several lots and loads of good.

Good cattle sold readily, and there was a fair trade, but common grassers sold at low prices.

Exporters—Very few export cattle were on sale. We heard of one medium load that sold at \$5.20 per cwt. Bulls sold at lower prices. T. Connor bought one load, 1,200 to 1,600 pounds, at \$5.50 to \$4.75.

Butchers—Geo. Rowntree bought 300 butchers for the Harris Abattoir Co. at \$4 to \$5.15 for steers and heifers, and a few choice picked cattle up to \$5.35; cows at \$2.50 to \$4.50.

Stocks and Feeders—Feeders, 950 to 1,050 pounds each, at \$3.85 to \$4.25; feeders, 900 to 900 pounds, of good quality, \$3.50 to \$3.90; good stockers, 500 to 700 pounds each, at \$3.25 to \$3.50; common eastern stockers, although few on sale, are not worth more than \$2.25 to \$2.60 per cwt.

Milkers and Springers—Prices ranged from \$30 to \$50, and we only heard of one cow all week that sold at \$60, and very few bring \$50.

Veal Calves—Receipts fairly large, with the dull trade of the season. Prices easy at \$3 to \$5.50 per cwt.

Sheep and Lambs—Export ewes sold at \$3.50 to \$4 per cwt.; rams, \$2.50 to \$3 per cwt.; lambs came forward in large numbers, the result being easier prices, which will go still lower. Lambs sold from 6 to 12 to 12 per pound.

Hogs—Receipts from all sources by rail were 1,422. The market for hogs was the strongest of the season. H. P. Kennedy reports buying 1,500 this week at \$8 f.o.b. cars at country points; \$8.25 to \$8.35 fed and watered, and \$8.50 to \$8.65 off cars.

### FARMERS' MARKET.

Offerings of grain were small to-day, being confined to 300 bushels of oats, which sold at 62c per bushel.

Hay quiet and steady, with sales of 17 loads at \$16 to \$18 a ton for old, and at \$11 to \$12 for new. Straw is nominal at \$13 to \$13.50 per ton.

Dressed hogs are unchanged at \$11 for heavy, and at \$11.25 to \$11.50 for light.

#### THE CHEESE MARKETS.

Kingston, Ont.—There were 1,612 boxes registered on the Frontenac board to-day. Sales were at 11 3-16, 11 1-2 to 11 3-8, the board being well cleaned up.

Belleville, Ont.—To-day there were offered 3,000 cheese; sales, 1,200 at 11 3-8, 400 at 11 7-16; balance refused 11 5-16 and 11 3-8.

Brookville, Ont.—To-day 3,600 boxes were registered, 930 white, balance colored; 11 1-4 for white and 11 3-8 for colored offered on board, but none sold.

#### BRITISH CATTLE MARKETS.

London—London cables for cattle are firm, at 12 to 13c per lb. for Canadian steers, dressed weight; refrigerator beef is quoted at 9 1-2 to 10c per lb.

#### COBALT STOCKS.

A dull market followed the announcement yesterday of the passing of the Coniages dividend, and there was little activity on the Mining Exchange. Coniages sold as low as 5.25, almost a dollar below the price of the previous day, but closed somewhat higher, with only a few sales. The directors have announced that the 3 per cent. dividend, payable Aug. 1, will not be paid, as a large amount of money will be spent in doubling the capacity of the concentrating mill and in equipping the mine with electric power.

Considerable selling of Scotia was done, the stock opening at 78 and closing at 74 3-4. Beaver sold around 58, but showed some strength and closed a fraction higher. La Rose was at 43 on the Standard, but in London the stock sold at the equivalent of 8.62, the highest point it has yet touched. Crown Reserve also went to a higher mark, a few lots selling at 3.65 on the local exchange.

## THE TRIGGER.

Buffalo, July 23.—J. E. Jennings, of Toronto, was the high mark for the five 20-target events shot yesterday morning at the Inter-State Association's Eastern handicap tournament. He lost only one target, thus bringing his score up to 99, which is the highest record made during the present tournament. Another amateur, A. B. Richardson, of Dover, Del., won second place with 98. These amateurs, H. I. Hess, of Nanticoke, Pa.; W. Henderson, of Lexington, Ky., and D. Wadsworth, of Auburn, N. Y., tied for third at 97.

The Eastern Handicap, the final and chief event, was won yesterday afternoon by H. E. Smith, a hitherto laurel-less amateur from Columbus, Ohio, who broke 98 out of 100 targets at a distance of 18 yards. Second place was taken by the well known professional, W. R. Crosby, of O'Fallon, Ill., who scored 97 from 21 yards. Second among the amateurs was F. D. Peltier, of Mount Clemens, Mich., who, from 18 yards, scored 96. Third amateur was H. I. Hess, of Nanticoke, Pa., the winner of the preliminary handicap yesterday. To-day he had to take 21 yards, and made only 95 hits. Tying for second among the professionals with a score of 95 were J. R. Taylor, of Atlanta, and J. S. Fanning, of New York.

## LEVEL CRO SINGS.

Railway Commission Draws on Fund—To Protect Crossing.

(Special Despatch to the Times.)

Ottawa, Ont., July 23.—The Railway Commission has ordered the first draft on the Parliamentary appropriation of \$1,000,000, extending over the next five years, to assist in the elimination of level railway crossings throughout Canada. The commission has ordered the protection by gates of the Canadian Pacific crossing at Raglan street, Renfrew, and twenty per cent. of the cost of installing the gates is to be taken out of the federal funds, the balance being paid by the Canadian Pacific Railway. The cost of a watchman at the gates is apportioned equally between the railway company and the town.

Sixty men and women, members of the Cioakmakers' Industrial Union, went on strike in the establishment of J. H. Alderman & Co., Montreal, because the firm refused to accede to their demands for better conditions.
