

> As a rule all applications were initialed by me. Oct. 18th 1889 met Mr. Currie at the court at Petersville, G. F. Baird was there, and a conversation took place respecting the sending of applications to Fredericton. When making up my preliminary list in 1886 I was allowed by law to receive applications there, and I told Currie so during that year, applications received on the 18th Oct. 1889 were ruled out, because the time was up. They had been sent to Fredericton, and not to Gagetown. Were mailed at St. John on the very last day, and did not reach me within the time allowed by law, nor at my office in Gagetown. Mr. Babbitt would receive my letters at that place, and would make a memoranda of the dates of receipt. In 1886 the law did not fix the place where these applications were to be received but it does now. Did not receive applications from Sunbury in this city in 1889.
