

Boise, Idaho, June 6 – Harry Or-chard crowned his admissions of grave crimes to-day when continuing on at the time, and Orchard decided by the time, and Orchard decided the time, and the time, and Orchard decided the time, and the time his case against Wm. Haywood, He made a detailed confession of the murder of, former Governor Frank Steunenberg by an infernal machine that directly paves the way for his own conviction and execution for the mortal office. He swore that the as-sasination of Steunenberg was first suggested by Haywood, Moyer, Pettibone and himself, was financed by Haywood strict for a month. While there he consulted about kidnapping the child

himself, was financed by Haywood and was executed by himself, after the failure of an attempt in which Jack Simpkins participated. Orchard litted the total of his own victims by murder to eighteen, detailed the cir-murder ex-Governor Peabody, Judge Goddard, Judge Gabbert, General Sherman Bell, Dave Moffatt and Frank Hearn. 
