Death of Dr. Allan.

One of the best known and the most genial of men passed away suddenly at the railway station, Harbor Grace this morning. The Bay Metropolis in the person of "Dr. Will" has lost one who embodied in his person the genius and goodwill of the bay. Dr. William Munden Allan was born at Brigus. May 26th, 1844. He received his school education at Harbor Grace Grammar School and at Scott's Academy, St. John's. After leaving school he dispensed drugs in Harbor Grace, where his father had an extensive practice as a medical man. After a time he proceeded to the University of Edinburgh, and attended the medical schools and walked the surgical wards. Here he took his degree and secured his qualification as a medical
