LONDON, Sept. 11.
Four hundred men attached to the two battleships of the Russian Black Sea fleet have been arrested at Sebastopol, according to an Odessa despatch to the Standard. Capt. Shubin, one of those taken in custody, attempted suicide. Some petty officers are also among the prisoners. The arrests continue in connection with the recent mutinies on the warships. The private quarters of the officers ashore are being searched.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Sept. 11.
King Alfonso and Queen Victoria open an Anti-Tuberculosis Congress here, delegates coming from many countries. A Porto Rican delegate created a scene by demanding a national recognition and declared he would not participate in the Convention until the same honor was shown his country as the other countries. The Committee had some difficulty in making the patriot realize that they were unable to recognize Porto Rico an independent country.

LONDON, Sept. 10.
The six-power group has requested explanations of the report that negotiations have been entered into by China for a fifty million loan in London, says the Pekin correspondent of the Times. The explanation given by the Chinese Government is that the negotiations were begun by the late Finance Minister, who continued them independently. It is reported that the negotiations are nearly completed.

LONDON, Sept. 10.
The agreement for a loan of \$50,000,000 at five per cent. for forty years, was signed on August 30th by the Chinese Minister and a representative of Lloyd's Bank. The loan is secured upon unpledged revenues, chiefly, the salt duty is to be free of control and supervision, which proved the obstacle to the loan by the six-power group. The salt duty is to be controlled by the British Inspector-General of Customs in case of default. Americans are said to have arranged the agreement. It is contended in some quarters that the Chinese Minister was without power to sign the agreement.

A Big Catch.

Here is a new fish story concerning three Canadian authors and one of the most noted fishing grounds in Canada: Arthur MacFarlane, Archie McKinnon, and Arthur Stringer were sharing the same camp in Algonquin Park. None of them had made an exceptional record, as an angler, but what each does not know—or thinks he knows—

about fish is not worth mentioning. One night as the nimrods sat about their camp fire, MacFarlane declared that he had that day witnessed a salmon trout leap ten feet in the air and pick a butterfly off the wing of a tree. "Quite possible," agreed Stringer. "I have frequently seen salmon trout leap half-way up a twenty-foot fall, hold themselves midway, by some strange power, and make the remaining distance at a single leap."

"And if you notice," said McKinnon, "trout usually, in fact always, jump against the wind, just as a wild duck flings against it. They do it to keep their scales from becoming ruffled. Last summer I saw a man stand on a narrow strip of land between two of these lakes and catch fifty salmon trout, and he had nothing but an ordinary landing-net. He caught the fish in it as they leaped from one lake to another. If they hadn't started jumping in pairs and carried away his landing-net, he'd have caught a thousand.—Toronto Star.

LONDON, Sept. 4.—The first international match of the season was played last evening when the English and Scottish cupholders met Glasgow. The game ended one goal each.
