## LATEST From the Front

### TEUTONS ENCIRCLING LEMBERG.

LONDON, To-day. If Germans transferred troops from East to West as reported, they have held sufficient men on the Eastern front to continue without relaxation the offensive that carried them and the Austrians almost across Galicia. The forces which pinched Przemyśl into surrender are battling their way Eastward, and according to both German and Austrian official communications are at one point Southeast hardly more than 60 miles from the Russian frontier. The troops which swept through Stry have continued further East until they are 30 miles beyond that town equally beyond the Lemberg position which appears perilous. Further North they are 18 miles East of Przemyśl, so that roughly speaking the encircling movement of Lemberg is duplicating that of Przemyśl. The Germans are also on the offensive in the Baltic Provinces. Their official statement records crossing the River Windau, South-east of Libau.

### THE LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch received in London to-day says a telegram from Riga shows the Germans active North and Northeast East of Libau. Military authorities expect heavy fighting at Mostyry, where the Russians will make a determined stand. Hard fighting and heavy losses on both sides occurred notably in North Ardas, where the French seem determined to nibble their way forward and continue East but the contests hardly are more than trench warfare contrasted with the fighting in Galicia. It is reported that Zeppelin raids on England aroused the British airmen to extraordinarily vigorous action. The raid on the Zeppelin shed near Brussels and the bringing down of the Zeppelin with its crew near Ghent were carried out about the same time. Italy since she has thrown her troops in the field and her navy on the side of the Allies has been taken into the financial circle of nations warring against Germany. At a recent meeting of the British Chancellor of the Exchequer and the Italian Minister of the Treasury, an agreement was reached to pool resources just as Britain, France and Russia previously agreed.

### BURNING ZEPPELIN DROPPED ON CONVENT.

LONDON, To-day. The Daily Telegraph's Rotterdam correspondent gives the following additional details of the destruction of the Zeppelin airship near Ghent. Sub-Lieutenant Warnford was assisted in his attack on the Zeppelin by a French aeroplane. The aeroplanes pursued the Zeppelin a long distance, harassing it with rifle fire, while the German craft replied with rifles and machine guns. The opportunity to use bombs did not come until the Zeppelin was compelled to decrease her speed, as it was approaching the Hangar near Ghent. Warnford's bombs were immediately effective. Unhappily the airship crashed down on the Grand Beguinage de Sainte Elizabeth, one of the best known nunneries in Belgium which is situated in the suburbs at St. Almand. The burning mass fired the building over which it dropped. These buildings were filled with nuns and 700 Belgian women and children refugees. Terrible scenes followed. A man bent on rescue, leaped from a window with a child in his arms. Both were killed. The Zeppelin was the largest yet seen in Belgium and was returning from an expedition along the Belgian coast.

### ITALIANS BOMBARD NON-FALCONE AND POLA.

ROME, To-day. A statement of the Chief Italian



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Staff says on the 7th our destroyer flotilla bombarded Montevideo for the third time. Three batteries in position near Dulio Castle opened a well sustained fire against our destroyers which turning their guns upon batteries reduced one to silence and set the castle on fire. Our destroyers returned undamaged. The preceding night our dirigibles executed another raid on Pola, dropping several bombs which exploded at points of a military nature.

### CONSTANTINOPLE IN DIRE STRAITS.

PARIS, To-day. All information reaching here from Constantinople, says a correspondent at Athens, agree in representing the situation of the city as almost desperate. The Young Turks are in dire Straits. They are only being upheld by the insistence and ceaseless efforts of the German Ambassador and Enver Pasha, War Minister. Medical supplies in the city have been exhausted and lack of coal has forced many flour mills and the waterworks which supply the city with drinking water to shut down.

### TEUTONS TALKING PEACE.

AMSTERDAM, To-day. The Cologne correspondent of the Tys says a report is current that Austria-Germany will shortly announce their conditions of peace in which emphasis will be given to the declaration that the German Allies are not engaged in a war of conquest but seek only to secure the security of their territories.

### NAVAL CHIEF DEAD.

PARIS, To-day. Admiral Aubert, Chief of the General Staff of the French Navy, is dead.

### STREAM CHOKED WITH DEAD.

LONDON, To-day. The fiercest fighting of the war as far as the Baltic Provinces of Russia are concerned, occurred a few days ago in the battle for the mastery of the Dubysa River, according to a Petrograd correspondent, the River changed hands five times in one day and at nightfall the stream was completely choked with bodies of thousands of dead, so that a plank roadway of the artillery was laid by the victorious Russians across the solid bridge of bodies.

### ITALIAN SUCCESS CONTINUES.

ROME, To-day. The Italian troops are proceeding methodically to take possession of most important positions all along the frontier, according to a statement issued at headquarters.

### SCHOONER TORPEDOED.

LONDON, To-day. Four members of the crew of the Russian schooner Adolf, sunk by a German submarine, have arrived in Leth. They report that no warning was given them by the submarine.

### RUSSIANS ORGANIZING AMMUNITION FACTORIES.

LONDON, To-day. The Times Petrograd correspondent describes how the Russian authorities are organizing every possible industry for the production of ammunition and running factories day and night with three shifts of men, and engaging every available specialist and additional student of the Technical Colleges.

### NORWEGIANS TORPEDOED.

LONDON, To-day. The Norwegian steamers Trudvang and Superb were sunk by German submarines.

### DROWNED BY SEA WOLVES.

LONDON, To-day. The Belgian steamer Menalier was sent to the bottom by a German torpedo near the North Foreland. Out of 23 persons only six were saved.

### FOUR SUBMARINES NETTED.

NEW YORK, To-day. Four German submarines were captured in the Firth of Tay, on the west coast of Scotland, in a recent raid, according to officers of the liner Cameronia, which arrived from Glasgow to-day. These undersea craft made a raid up the Firth and passed under the Tay bridge and were caught on their return in nets spread by port authorities.

### ROUMANIA MOBILIZES.

BUCHAREST, To-day. Roumania's first step toward entering the conflict was taken yesterday, when the King signed the initial mobilization order. No doubt remains in the minds of any one here that it had definitely decided to join the Allies in the war against Germany and Austria.

### THE POPE AND PEACE CONGRESS.

ROME, To-day. The Giornale D Italia states the Vatican intends to propose a Peace Congress, the Pope presiding with full powers. The report states the Pope's plan for Congress is supported by Austria and several neutral powers.

### MORE SOLDIERS LANDED.

ATHENS, To-day. Reports to-day from Mitylene say the Allies continue to land fresh troops at the Dardanelles. The Allied fleet, it was said, resumed bombardment of Turkish positions on Saturday.

### SUBMARINE SUNK.

PARIS, To-day. A submarine believed to be of Austrian nationality has been sunk at the Western entrance to the Dardanelles, says a despatch from Mitylene to-day.

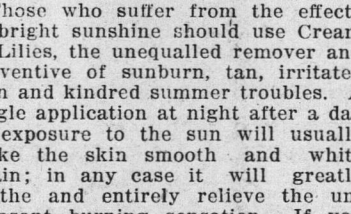

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## Cable News.

### CONSTANTINE'S ILLNESS CRITICAL.

ROME, To-day. A despatch from Athens says the condition of King Constantine of Greece suddenly has become very grave.

### STEAMER ASHORE.

HALIFAX, N.S., To-day. The Plant liner A. W. Perry, Capt. Ellis, from Boston, Halifax, ran ashore this morning in a thick fog at the mouth of Halifax Harbor. The passengers, forty-two, were taken off. It is hoped that the vessel will be refloated.

### DEVOTION OF SOLDIERS SAVED A BRITISH OFFICER.

London, May 29.—Lieut. Hellyer, of the 4th East Yorks Territorials, who is now in a hospital at Boulogne, owes his life to the devotion of his men in the ranks, who kept him from bleeding to death by taking turns in holding an artery. The officer's left arm was blown off by a shell, and his right arm badly injured. The main artery of the severed arm was exposed. But one of his men pinched it with his fingers. When the man's hand tired, another took his place in holding the artery. No surgical aid was available, and for three days Lieut. Hellyer lay in the bottom of the trench with only this primitive aid from his soldiers, between him and death.
