### Not Yet Completed.

We learn that the Government has not yet completed the temporary agreement for the operation of the railway until November 15. In other words while the signatures of those representing the Company have been made to the document, Government representatives have not yet signed. The agreement therefore is null and void, until such time as the signatures of the party of the other part are attached. What the design is in this withholding the signatures of the Government agents it is difficult to determine. That they are pledged to the completion of the agreement goes without saying, but if anything has arisen in the interim, restraining the Government from carrying out its part of the agreement, publicity should be given it. The Daily News this morning publishes an item to the effect that last afternoon the Reid Newfoundland Company issued a bulletin to all employees announcing the appointment of Mr. R. C. Morgan as General Manager of Railways, Steamships and the Express Company. From this it may be deduced that all parties to the agreement have signed and agreed to the terms. At the same time it must be borne in mind that the Prime Minister, who is also Colonial Secretary, went out to Grand Falls by Thursday's express, and that the agreement had not been signed by that gentleman in the latter capacity up to that time. It could not therefore have been signed by him during his absence, unless by deputy. Not that the signing or nonsigning will make a great deal of difference in the long run, as the Colony has been tacitly committed to the arrangement—whether original or amended—made with the Company. The question that naturally arises in the minds of the people may be briefly given. Has the Government made up their mind to abandon their former policy, and let the railway operations be conducted without any supervision on their part? The amended agreement may have made provision for this, as it is most singular that the agreement was still under discussion when the House closed, and the corrected text had not been submitted to the members. It is more than odd that, according to the source of our information, the Government have not yet made up their mind to sign, and yet their refusal cannot be reconciled with the fact that trains and boats are being run, unless it so happens that the Government is in a hole. The whole story smacks of the mysterious, whichever way it is read, but there need be no doubt in the minds of any person as to who will have to bear the responsibility of financial loss. The taxpayers of this unfortunate island will have to foot the bill. It is a pleasant prospect they have to visualise.

### His Grace the Archbishop RECEIVING MEDICAL ATTENTION.

The celebration of the Silver Jubilee of his Grace Archbishop Roche, arranged to take place tomorrow (Sunday), has been postponed owing to the indisposition of his Grace. During the past week the Archbishop has been very unwell and his medical adviser has enjoined a complete rest with the cancelling of all engagements. His Grace whose Silver Jubilee as a priest occurs to-day was ordained at All Hallows College, Dublin, on the 24th of June 1897, and consecrated Archbishop of St. John's on the 29th of June, 1915. His many friends will be saddened to-day to learn that his illness prevents the celebration of this important event in his distinguished career.

A short time ago his Grace received an autographed photograph from his Holiness Pope Pius XI. and during the present week came a cablegram from His Eminence Cardinal Gasparri which conveyed the good wishes and blessing of the Sovereign Pontiff, and which reads as follows: "His Holiness extends fraternal greetings on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of your sacerdotal ordination. He blesses you, the Archdiocese, your relatives and friends with all his heart and implores for you in abundance of Divine favours and many fruitful years of service for the welfare of souls. Gasparri."

That the good wishes contained in the Pope's message may be realised as well as that his Grace may be quickly restored to health will be the sincere prayer of the whole community to-day.

### Discovery Day.

To-day (Saturday), the feast of St. John the Baptist is "Discovery Day" in the history of Newfoundland, for on June 24th, 1497—so history tells us—John Cabot made his landfall at Cape Bonaville (disputed by some), having been out fifty-three days from Bristol, in a little ship called the *Matthew*, manned by sixteen English sailors and one Burgundian. The following extract from old records will be of interest to-day:—

"This year (1497) on St. John the Baptist's Day, the land of America (Newfoundland) was found by merchants of Bristol, in a ship of Bristol (Bristol) called the *Matthew*, the which said ship departed from the port of Bristol, the 2nd of May, and came home the 6th of August following."

CODFISH PACKED AS LOBSTERS.  
Mr. T. Hallett, who has spent the past six weeks in England on business and who returned by the S.S. Digby, has stated to the *Telegraph* representative that complaint of what looks like fraud on the part of lobster packers was brought to his notice by an English firm with connections on the continent. This with the regular lobster numbers on them, but containing codfish have been returned to this firm from Holland.

### Rosalind Sails.

About 110 second class passengers left by S.S. Rosalind to-day for New York and other American ports. Some 30 first class passengers also sailed. ### Commemoration Service

QUEEN'S THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE.

S.S. Portia, Capt. Connors, arrived from the Labrador at 1.20 p.m. She reports much ice off the coast. The Portia experienced fine weather during the greater part of the trip, but it was very foggy since Battle Harbour was left on the homeward run. The ship took aboard 400 passengers, fishermen and their wives, to points on the Labrador Coast.

He has visited the Labrador several seasons and is well known to the fishermen and residents of the coast. Mr. Cabot has published a book on Labrador which is an interesting compilation. He leaves by the S.S. *Portia* for St. John's North West River, Hamilton Inlet.

### Newfoundland Trade.

CAPT. EDWARDS' REPORT.  
A most optimistic report of the trade of this country has been prepared by Capt. E. J. Edwards, late Senior Trade Commissioner in Canada and Newfoundland.

Like most other countries, Newfoundland has been passing through a period of depression, but confidence is felt that the resources of the country, combined with the spirit of the people, will lead to a speedy recovery. Tribute is paid to the thriftiness of the people, many people of the working classes having saved enough to tide them over hard times.

"Fishing is the oldest industry of Newfoundland," says the Commissioner, and it still appears to be the governing factor which regulates the life and business of the community. A plea is advanced for more co-operation from the United Kingdom, and particularly from manufacturers who use cod oil or cod liver oil. The report also urges that fishermen's requisites—nets, lines, warm clothing, and rubber boots—should be exported to Newfoundland in greater quantities from Great Britain.

The main purpose of the report is the encouragement of trade between the United Kingdom and Newfoundland. During the year 1920-21 Newfoundland imports from the United Kingdom were valued at \$9,230,305, a fall of over a million dollars from the previous year. The percentage of British imports was only 11.2 as against the 51.3 of Canada and 33 of the United States. In a section headed "Suggestions to British Manufacturers" the Commissioner says: "I cannot too strongly urge upon our Kingdom manufacturers the importance of visiting Newfoundland personally, or of sending their representatives at frequent intervals. Many manufacturers arrange for Canada to be visited periodically, but completely ignore Newfoundland."

### Express Derailed.

TWO CARS LEAVE TRACK.  
Two cars of the incoming express were derailed early this morning west of Humbermouth. No injuries were sustained by passengers. A delay of five hours was caused as some difficulty was experienced in replacing the cars on the track. The express is due to arrive at 3 o'clock to-night.

BOUGHT COAL BULK.—A bulk of coal containing some 2,500 tons landed at the Purness Wharf pier from the S.S. Basan, was purchased at auction this morning by Mr. Peter Cashin. The Basan, an American Shipping Board steamer, arrived here over a year ago having sprung a leak which necessitated the removal of her cargo.
