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CAUSE OF KING'S DEATH EXPLAINED

the world, to aid every meritable endeavor for the alleviation of human suffering and to unite in justice and freedom all the races and classes of his subjects within his Imperial throne. We beg to offer your majesty our loyal congratulations upon your auspicious accession and we assure your majesty of our devotion to his royal person and secure conviction his reign will, under the favor of divine providence, be distinguished by unswerving efforts to promote the virtue and contentment of the realm and to guard the rights and liberties of his majesty's faithful people.

Premier Asquith's Tribute.—Speaking on the motion Mr. Asquith referred to the reign of "The Great King" so suddenly taken from us "as years crowded with moving events throughout the Empire."

He continued: "In our relations with foreign countries, they have been years of growing friendship and new undertakings, strong and sure safeguards of the peace of mankind. Within the Empire the sense of interdependence, the concentration of common interests and common risks and of the ever tightening bonds of co-operative unity has been developed as never before."

"Here at home and by way of contrast, controversial issues of the gravest kind: economical, social and constitutional have risen with rapid maturity. In all of these multifarious manifestations of our national and imperial life, history will assign a part of particular dignity and authority to the great ruler whom we have lost. In external affairs, his powerful personal influence was directed, steadily and ceaselessly, toward avoiding not only war but the causes and pretexts of war, and he well earned the title of today, he well always be remembered 'The Peacemaker of the World.'"

The premier then moved an expression of sympathy to the Queen Mother Alexandra on the irreparable loss which she had sustained assuring her that the house of commons and the nation would ever preserve towards her sentiments of unshakable affection. While he was speaking Mr. Asquith was obviously deeply affected. When he expressed the sympathy which the House felt for the Queen Mother he all but broke down.

Speaking along similar lines in the house of lords, the Earl of Crewe, was well high overcome with emotion and concluded his remarks with difficulty.

American Women Express Sympathy.—Atlantic City, N. J., May 11.—A resolution expressing the sorrow of the 500 women of the Daughters of the Revolution, because of the death of King Edward was adopted at the final business session of the convention here today. A letter of condolence was also ordered sent to Queen Alexandra, carrying the sympathy of the American women to the bereaved monarch.

Toronto Will be Represented.—Toronto, Ont., May 11.—Mayor Geary is on his way to London, England, to be present at the funeral of the late King Edward. He is accompanied by a representative. The decision to send the mayor to the funeral was arrived at by the board of control at a private meeting in the mayor's office at noon today and his worship at once became busy making arrangements to the early evening train for New York. He expects to sail from New York at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning on the French steamer La Savane.

Memorial Service in Winnipeg.—Winnipeg, May 10.—The members of the ministerial association plan to make Winnipeg union memorial service in honor of the dead king, who was the life work of the departed ruler and as the Royal body is being borne in state to its last resting place, all Winnipeg will participate in the service which is now being arranged.

The horse show auditorium has been engaged for the service, but it is thought that it may not prove large enough and if weather conditions are favorable the affair will likely be out of doors. If the plan which are now being considered are carried out, the service will be a semi-military one.

The committee in charge desire the soldiers, the school cadets, and every military body in the city to attend and it has also been suggested that the different lodges in the city take part. The school children who are members of the cadets will also be asked to attend. The memorial service itself will be of a very simple nature and will be arranged so that people of every race and creed will be able to take part. Short addresses on the life of the king will be made by several of the clergy present and there will be a musical programme in fitting with the occasion.

The Masons of the province of Manitoba will honor the memory of King Edward on the day of the funeral by a special session of the Grand Lodge of the province which will convene in Winnipeg on that date.

The exact nature of the ceremony which the Grand Lodge will take part in has not as yet been arranged, but it will be of a simple nature and in keeping with the principles of the order. The record attendance is expected, and the ceremony will be one of the most impressive ever held by the Masons of the west.

Charge of Manslaughter Against Moran Dismissed.—Tommy McCarthy's Death Was Accidental and No Ground for Charge.—San Francisco, Cal., May 11.—Charges of manslaughter against Owen Moran and others, preferred on account of the death of Tommy McCarthy, following a knock-out blow struck by Moran, were dismissed today by Police Judge Conto. The judge held that as all the conditions imposed by law had been complied with and as the coroner's jury had pronounced McCarthy's death accidental, there was no ground on which to hold the defendants.

Danger of Forest Fires in Ontario.—Toronto, May 11.—Unless there is rain soon, and heavy rain, the woods in Northern Ontario will be in serious danger from forest fire. Such was the report of Donald Sutherland, provincial director of colonization who returned from the north yesterday.
