Demise of J. R. Gemmill.

J. R. Gemmill, Sarnia, who died on May 24, was the founder of the Observer, and for nearly 25 years its editor and proprie-

24, was the founder of the Observer, and
for nearly 25 years its editor and proprietor. Many are still living who remember the arrival of Mr. Gemmill in Sarnia
from Perth, in the county of Lanark,
in 1854, and the birth of the Observer
the same year. Politics were of the rough and ready order in those days, and stormy scenes in hustings and at polling booths were the rule, rather than the exception. and ready order in those days, and stormy scenes in hustings and at polling booths were the rule, rather than the exception. Mr. Gemmill was a sturdy champion in the cause of Liberalism, as old files of the Observer will show and old readers will recollect. In 1878 he relinquished the editorial chair and proprietorship of the paper to Messrs. Eyvel & Gorman, and since then has lived the quiet life of a retired citizen. During his long residence in Sarnia he filled several public offices of trust, serving in the Council and as school trustee, and as clerk of the County Court and registrar of the Surrogat Court for the county of Lambton. The latter position he resigned in tavor of his son, W. R. Gemmill, about the time he retired from the proprietorship of the Observer. Though the times in which the most active years of Mr. Gemmill's life were spent were noted for the bitterness with which political warfare was waged—a bitterness that extended into social as well as municipal matters—deceased always commanded the respect of friends and opponents. The Observer under his management was conducted with scrupulous honesty and rigid regard for purity and morality in the matter that appeared in its columns. He was born in Dalrey, Scotland, in 1803, and reached the patriarchal age of 83 years. Death was more the result of enfebled vitality resulting from old age than from any particular form of disease, and he passed peacefully away. He leaves a widow, one daughter and three sons—J. SR. Gemmill, of the Chatham Bauner; F. A. Gemmill, in the railway mall service, Stratford, and W. R. Gemmill, clerk and registrar of the Lambton county courts. The funeral was very largely attended, the mayor and town councilors members of the school board and county officials being among those who escorted the remains to their last resting place in Lakeview Cemetery. The town flag was also hung at half mast as a mark of respect for the dead.
