BRITISH RAILWAY ACCIDENT. London, Sept. 23.-An express and an excursion train collided today at the March Cambridgeshire station of the Great Eastern Railway. Both trains were wrecked, and seventeen persons were injured, many of them seriously.

Liverpool, Sept. 23.-The council of the British Association have included the following Canadians in the list of honorary vice-presidents for the Toronto meeting in 1897: His Excellency the Earl of Aberdeen, Hon. Wilfrid Laurier, the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., Hon. G. W. Ross, President Loudon and Sir Wm. Dawson.

EXPECT TO GET TYNAN. London, Sept. 23.-It is learned here upon fairly good authority that in official quarters little doubt is now entertained that the extradition of Tynan, the alleged dynamiter, will be granted by the French Government. The belief is very general English people that if the famous "No. 1" is brought here for trial, his conviction and execution are a foregone conclusion.

A RUSSO-AMERICAN LINE St. Petersburg, Sept. 23.-It is understood that United States capitalists are negotiating with the Russian Government for the establishment of a rapid steamship service between San Francisco and Vladivostock. In connection with the above statement it is said that a French company is being formed, supported by the Minister of Commerce, to run a regular steamship service between Dunkirk and Vladivostock.

TRVING IN "CYMBELINE." London, Sept. 23.-"Cymbeline" was produced at the Lyceum Theater by Henry Irving last night. The play was magnificently staged and the dresses were superb. In the early parts there was some dragging, and here modification is needed. The critics in the foyer were of the opinion that the whole play was comewhat below the Lyceum standing. BRITISH COASTS STORM-SWEPT. London, Sept. 23.-A terrific gale has swept over this city and the coasts of the United Kingdom. The loss of life, however, is reported to be slight. Red Star Line steamship Rhynland (Capt. Heavy seas swept over her and flooded her deckhouse and state-rooms. The mail boat running between Calais and Dover was badly damaged by the storm.

A RUSSIAN TRIUMPH. London, Sept. 23. - The Times expresses the belief that Russia and Japan have agreed to a foint protectorate in Corea, Russia virtually taking the position there that China held before the war. The King of Corea will quit the Russian legation, where he has been since the assassination of the pro-Japanese Ministers, and will return in triumph to the palace. This arrangement, the Times asserts, will be carried out simultaneously with Japan's evacuation of Corea. The Times editorially regards the foregoing arrangement as a great diplomatic victory for Russia, "who," says the Times, "thereby obtains a virtual ascendancy in Corean affairs, leaving Japan only a nominal share in the control, with the bare satisfaction of saving appearances, and of gaining time for final solution in the future. Japan has missed one of the main objects of her ambition by impatience, and by an incapacity to deal with the situation '

WELCOMED BY THE QUEEN. Ballster, Sept. 23 .- The special train. which conveyed the Czar and Czarina from Leith, arrived here last evening at 7 o'clock. The railway station was brilliantly illuminated by means of electric lights, and the scene presented was a handsome one. A large crowd gathered, people from all the surrounding country having come to the town in order to get a view of their Russian Majesties, the Prince of Wales and the other members of the imperial party. The Duke and Duchess of York and the Duke of Cambridge were at the station to welcome the Czar and Czarina. The latter affectionately kissed the Duchess, and the salutation was heartily returned. The famous Black Watch Regiment was present as a guard of honor, and the regimental band played the Russian and British anthems, while the party were at the station. After greetings had been exchanged, the members of the party entered the royal carriages, each of which was drawn by four horses, and escorted by a detachment of dragoons, started for Balmoral. The crowd cheered lustily as the party drove away. When their Majesties entered the royal demesne they were met by the Queen's ervants, wearing kilts and bearing Lochaber axes and torches. scene was most striking and picturesque, as the party were conducted along the heavily-wooded avenue, leading to the main entrance of the Queen's Highland residence. Here her Majesty, surrounded by a group of royalties, received her guests. Affecionate greetings were exchanged and short conversations were indulged in, after which the imperial guests were escorted to the apartments set aside for their use. At 9 o'clock there was a grand family dinner, which was given at the castle.
