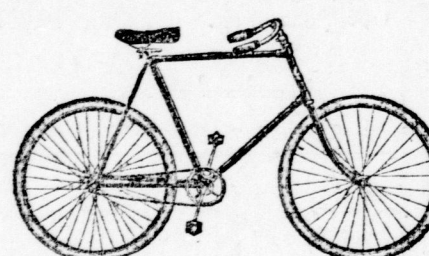

LOWER TEMPERATURE.

Toronto, June 3.—11 p.m.—Since last night the pressure has increased a little in Ontario and eastward to the Maritime Provinces, while west in the lake region it has decreased, the depression having passed northeastward from Kansas to Minnesota, causing rain in the Northwestern States and Eastern Manitoba. Showers have occurred in the more northern and eastern parts of Ontario. Elsewhere the weather has continued fine.

The minimum and maximum temperatures reported for today are: Edmonton, 26-76; Calgary, 34-72; Winnipeg, 44-58; Prince Albert, 46-70; Parry Sound, 60-72; Toronto, 72-92; Kingston, 58-76; Montreal, 58-70; Quebec, 52-70; Chatham, 38-64; Halifax, 42-68.

Toronto, June 4.—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours covering the lake region and as far east as Belleville are: Moderate winds; fine; stationary, or a little lower temperature.

TORNADO IN PRINCE EDWARD.

Pictou, Ont. June 3.—A tornado of wind and hail, lasting fifteen minutes, passed over the northern portion of this county this afternoon, and apparently expended its force on Cornwall Point and Big Bay, in the Bay of Quinte.

Three schooners in Big Bay were completely stripped of their canvas. Cornwall Point is a summer resort on the Bay of Quinte opposite Northport. All the cottages were more or less damaged. One cottage and a large boathouse were blown into the bay and floated away. Crops and early fruit were damaged by the hail.

ELECTRIC RAILWAY JOTTINGS.

At the conclusion of the City Council

meeting last night, Solicitor Ivey, of

the Street Railway Company, waited on

the council to ask that a committee be

appointed to wait with the company on

the County Council, which meets today,

with reference to the crossing of the

Dundas street bridge. Mr. Ivey said

that it would be necessary to secure the

consent of the County Council at this

session, as the fall meeting would be

too late to allow of the completion of

the Springbank line. The mayor and

No. 1 committee were appointed as a

deputation. This move settles beyond

question the route which the company

intends to take to reach Springbank.

The shareholders meet tomorrow

to ratify the franchise and to consider the

advisability of increasing the stock of

the company by \$250,000 or less.
