Anglo-Jap Treaty Satisfies Other Powers.

Serious Trouble in Macedonia Is Now Looked For.

Refusal of Turkey to Refund the Ransom Paid for Miss Stone by the United States-Cecil Rhodes Somewhat Better.

St. Petersburg, March 20 .- The official Messenger prints the text of a Russo-French conjoint declaration, sent March 16, to the Austrian, Belgian, British, American, Spanish, German, Italian, Dutch, Chinese and Japanese Governments. The declaration is as follows:

"The allied Russo-French Governments are wholly pleased to discern that the Anglo-Japanese convention supports the essential principles which, according to the riterated statement of France and Russia, the Earl of Glasgow, announced that constituted and still constitute the governments believe that the support type of torpedo boat destroyer, but of of these principles is also a guaran-

tee of their interests in the far east. "They are compelled, however, not to lose from view the possibly inimical action of other powers, or a repetition of disorders in China, possibly mpairing China's integrity and free velopment to the detriment of their reciprocal interests. Cabling from Pekin the correspondent of the London Times says . that owing to the presentation of the American note and the Anglo-Japanese protests, Russia's negotiations with the Russe-Chinese bank have been suspended, but that negotiations for the evacuation of Manchuria continue under modified Russian demands, which point to an ultimate settlement. These include the withdrawal of Russia from between the great wall and the Liao River within six months, from the Province of Mukden within a year, and if the state of the coun-

permits, from Kirin and Heilung Chiang within 18 months after the signing of the convention. The rebels in the southern provinces continue to defeat the imperial troops sent to subdue them, Gen. Ma and Marshal Su report that it is impossible to suppress the rebellion with the troops at their disposal, and the viceroy of Canton has requested Yuan Shi Kai, viceroy of Chi Li to send reinforcements from Chi Li. The Imperial troops have been de-

feated at Sak Shing and at Popak. In Yun Nan Province the rebels hold the town and district of Foo Chuen, 20 miles northwest of the prefectural town of Yun Nan. They have also captured the towns of Sin Chou and Fing King.

NO MENACE. London, March 20 .- The reply of Russia and France to the Angloas a menace. It implies no more than that the Franco-Russian alliance extends to the far east. The only newspaper that sees danger in it is the Daily Mail. The Morning Post, on the other hand says it is a declaration which all the world may note with equanimity. Not the least important point of the commuication is the emphatic manner in which France and Russia are spoken of as allied.
